

- IN MEMORIAM -

BRO. WALTER J. KIRBY HUSBAND, FATHER, MASONIC PHILATELIST SUPREME DEPARTED APRIL 1, 1984

Masonic Philately, as well as the Masonic Study Unit, suffered a major loss on April 1, 1984, when Bro. Walter J. Kirby was summoned to the Celestial Lodge above. He was born in 1901 and had led a very full Masonic life in his 82 plus years.

In 1923 Bro. Kirby received the degrees in Masonry in Coy Lodge No. 699, Coy, Arkansas, being raised on April 19 of that year. He demitted to Trinity Lodge No. 694, Little Rock, in 1962. He received the Scottish Rite degrees in March 1975 in Little Rock and on October 23, 1979, he was made Knight Commander of the Court of Honor (KCCH) in Scottish Rite Masonry. He never officially held a Lodge office but filled every chair except the East in various "emergency" situations.

Bro. Walter stated that he was a stamp collector as long as he was a Mason and that he enjoyed being able to combine the two avocations. He joined Bro. Clarence Beltmann's MSU during its first year of operation, 1960, as member No. 53. In June 1962 he suggested the inclusion of a question and answer column in the newsletter; he also tied for first place in the membership contest of that year and contributed several articles to the newsletter. He waited for six years before joining Bro. Nicholas Kontroulis' MSU of ATA group being assigned membership No. 366 in late 1973. Bro. Nick welcomed him to the group and again he contributed several articles over the following two years that the club was active.

His role in the Masonic Study Unit is well known. He was the original and only editor of The Philatelic Freemason with the first issue being prepared for May-June 1977. Since that time he has been responsible for 400 pages of news, information, checklists, questions and answers and general improvement of the knowledge in the Masonic Philately arena.

In the early part of this year, Bro. Walter suffered his third heart attack. He had been able to demonstrate excellent recovery on the two previous instances but he never fully recovered from this one being called by the Supreme Architect on April 1, 1984. He will be sadly missed by his family and friends and most especially by those who depended upon him as the source of their lore and knowledge in the combined avocations of Freemasonry and Stamp Collecting. Our sympathy goes to his widow, Camille Kirby, and other members of his family as well as our thanks for allowing him to serve us so unselfishly.

THE PHILATELIC FREEMASON WILL CONTINUE

Publication of The Philatelic Freemason will continue on a bi-monthly basis, picking up with Volume 8, No. 1; there will be no attempt to try to publish a Volume 7, No. 6, just to "fill out the record". The new editor is identified on the revised masthead at the top of the first page and my only hope is that I will be able to serve the membership as well as my predecessor. A few years back I had written to Bro. Kirby asking if he wanted an assistant; he replied that he wanted to maintain the editorship as a solo effort. When the recent chain of events was related there was no question but that I would volunteer for the role - especially as a tribute to him and to those who have helped him.

The task I face is enormous - I follow in the footsteps of several noted predecessors in the field of newsletter editorialship - Brothers John Mirt, Clarence Beltmann, Nicholas Koutroulis and Walter Kirby. Each had his style and fortes, perhaps I will also develop a style of my own. Several of the members know of me from my Masonic cacheted cover collecting and catalog publishing activities - those will continue in parallel to but separated from the activities of editor (or as much as they can be separated). I fully intend to provide equal time to all aspects of Masonic Philately - Masons on stamps, symbols on stamps, covers, post cards, cancellations, corner cards - dependent upon the wishes of the membership. These wishes will be measured by the contribution of articles, comments, suggestions, requests, etc. received from the members.

Volume 8 of The Philatelic Freemason represents several major challenges to the newsletter itself and to the Masonic Study Unit. The new slate of officers which is developing contains not only a new editor but also a new Secretary-Treasurer; Bro. Richard Needham has stepped down from that position after faithfully serving the unit since its organization in 1977. Our congratulations and words of support to Bro. Otto L. Steding as he assumes the role as our new Secretary-Treasurer. The trend of the ballots indicates that Bro. Thomas M. Gardner is our new President for the 1984-1986 term and Bro. Joseph A. Walkes, Jr., the Vice President. More later in the newsletter as the results are finalized.


One of the more significant changes, however, is that which has been experienced in the support of the newsletter - one of the most faithful contributors of articles which appear in various issues also passed on this year - Bro. Marshall Loke. His absence will certainly be felt by your editor and a large void is sitting in front of all of us. This void must and will be filled by those of us who want to remain active members and can research and write; all members want to learn, we should all also want to teach. I request the help of each and every one of you - write up your favorite topic, stamp, cover or even a significant experience related to Masonic Philately. I count on your assistance, editing the newsletter should not be a one man effort - I would be very happy with a situation in which I could just edit and publish with some research and writing.

I look forward to your written contributions.

We have reached the end of our "fiscal" year and dues are now payable to our Secretary-Treasurer. Some of the members have already submitted their renewals but there are many who must be prodded. I trust that the forthcoming year's issues of The Philatelic Freemason will prove to be worth the remittance now. Please remit promptly - those who have not renewed by the time of the July-August newsletter will not receive their copy of that issue.

MOU FIRST DAY COVERS

In keeping with previous regimes of the Masonic Stamp/Study Units of the American Topical Association, I will try my hand at publishing Masonic First Day Covers for applicable U.S. releases. Bro. Kirby's last cover was that prepared for the Harry S. Truman stamp in January. On rather short notice, I have generated two cacheted covers which will serve as my introduction to that field - one for Bro. Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., and one for Bro. Sen. Richard B. Russell, Jr.. Copies of the cachets are shown below. The terms will remain the same: \$1.00 each plus SASE to be ordered from the editor.



Future planned covers, as of this writing, include the St. Lawrence Seaway (Bros. Alexander Wiley and George Dondero) on June 26, Auguste Bartholdi in Aug. and Dr. Frank C. Laubach on September 2. All cover attempts will be for FDC's special events will be avoided as they tend to be meaningful to only small groups and not to the membership as a whole. The FDC's will be prepared in limited quantities of 150 to 200 each.

MSC OF NY IS 50 YEARS OLD

We extend our sincere congratulations to Bro. George Wettach, President of the Masonic Stamp Club of New York, his officers and the members of that group for reaching their 50th anniversary this year. This postal card sent out by the MSC of NY must bring back memories to anyone who was collecting covers in the late 1940's. The card indicates a FDOI of May 12 for the Alexandria 6c airmail stamp (Scott C40) - the actual first day was May 11. Also, whoever ordered the five covers on 1/19/68 as annotated on the bottom of the card missed the boat - by 19 years. I doubt they were still available on that date - at that low price.

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DR. FRANK CHARLES LAUBACH

On September 2, 1984, the USPS will issue a 30¢ denomination stamp in their Great American series for Dr. Frank (. Laubach, a Congregationalist Minister who campaigned against illiteracy throughout the world. The first day city will be Benton, Pa., his birthplace.

Frank C. Laubach was born on September 2, 1884, in Benton, Pa. He graduated from Princeton in 1909 and received his doctorate from Columbia University in 1915. He spent many years in the Philippines as a missionary and as a college dean (Union College) and as director of Maranaw Folks Schools. He conducted literacy tours throughout the world and was co-author of more than 200 primers for illiterate adults in over 165 languages embracing 51 countries. Dr. Laubach died in Syracuse, N.Y., on June 11, 1970, at the age of 85.

Brother Frank C. Laubach was a member of Benton Lodge No. 667, Benton, Pa., and was a 32° ASSR (NJ).



ST. LAWRENCE SEAWAY

ALEXANDER WILEY & GEORGE A DONDERO

The USPS and the Canadian Postal Department will unite on June 26, 1984, in issuing 20¢ commemoratives for the 25th anniversary of the St. Lawrence Seaway. This event is similar to that conducted on June 26, 1959, when the two countries also issued matching stamps to commemorate the opening of the Seaway.

This Seaway was created as a result of legislation introduced in 1953 by Senator Alexander Wiley and Congressman George A. Dondero, both of whom were Freemasons.



Alexander Wilev

Bro. Wiley was born on May 26, 1884, in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin. He was a graduate of the University of Wisconsin in 1907, was admitted to the bar and started a practice there in Chippewa Falls. He was elected to the U.S. Senate from Wisc. in 1938 and served in that capacity until 1962. During his career he served as chairman of the Senate judiciary and foreign relations committees. It was during the latter role that he co-authored and introduced the Seaway Bill which led to the creation of the St. Lawrence Seaway. He died on October 26, 1967 in Philadelphia, Pa.

Alexander Wiley (Cont'd)

Bro. Wiley started his Masonic career in 1908 in Chippewa Falls Lodge No. 176 being initiated on January 21, passed on February 18 and raised on March 17. He became a member of Chippewa Falls Chapter, RAM, No. 46 and was exalted on June 18, 1915. The Chippewa Falls Council No. 25, R&SM, greeted him on May 22, 1916, and he was Knighted in the Tanced Commandery No. 27, Order of the Temple, on July 12, 1922. He received the 32° in the Scottish Rite Valley of Eau Claire on May 20-21, 1929. In 1956 he received the Gourgas Medal from the Northern Jurisdiction, AASR, and he was received as an Honorary Member 33°, the Supreme Council, Boston, on September 25, 1957.

George A. Dondero

Bro. Dondero was born on December 16, 1883, in Detroit, Michigan. He was a graduate of Detroit College of Law in 1910 and entered law practice immediately. He was elected to the U.S. Congress from the 17th Michigan District and served in that role in the 73rd to the 81st Congresses. He presented the Wiley-Dondero Seaway Act to Congress while Bro. Wiley was presenting it to the Senate. He died in 1983.

Bro. Dondero received his degrees in Royal Oak Lodge No. 464, Royal Oak, Mich., being initiated on September 12, passed on October 24 and raised on November 21, all in 1916. He received his 32° AASR (NJ) at Detroit, Michigan. He was a member of the High Twelve Club of Royal Oak, Michigan, and honorary member of the same at Pontiac, Michigan.



TEODORO M. KALAW

The Philippines just recently issued a stamp which pictures Teodoro M. Kalaw. He had been previously shown as the person on the right of the semi-postal issue of April 1, 1949, (Scott No. B1).

Bro. Teodoro M. Kalaw was born at Lipa, Batangas, on March 31, 1884. He was a lawyer and statesman and served as the Secretary of the Interior. He died on December 4, 1940.

Bro. Kalaw was initiated on April 8, 1907, in Nilad Lodge No. 12, Manila, and passed to the Fellowcraft degree on March 7, 1911. He later served as Master of this Lodge. He assisted in the unification of the various constitutions to form a new Grand Lodge of the Philippines in 1917 and served the organization as Junior Grand Warden, Grand Orator, Grand Master and Grand Secretary. He wrote the first book of Freemasonry to be printed in the Philippines, published in 1920, and provided much of the information known today of that formation period.

GENERAL MARK WAYNE CLARK

On April 17, 1984, Mark Wayne Clark, the last of the World War II Generals, died at the Medical University of South Carolina. The four-star general led the Allied invasion of Italy at the head of the Fifth Army. Of the other four U.S. commanders in the war - Generals Dwight Eisenhower, Omar Bradley, George Patton and Douglas MacArthur - two more (Bradley and MacArthur) were Freemasons.



Mark Wayne Clark was born on May 1, 1896, at Madison Barracks, N.Y. He was graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1917. He later received honorary degrees from many colleges and universities both here and abroad. His progression up the military chain of command was steady from his commissioning as a 2nd lieutenant in April 1917 to achievement of the rank of full general in 1945.

During World War I he saw service as a battallion commander participating in the St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives. At the start of World War II he became the deputy chief of staff and then the chief of staff of the Army Ground Forces in 1942. Also in 1942 Gen. Clark was one of the officers who landed in Africa by submarine to confer with representatives of General Giraud on the forthcoming invasion by Allied forces. From the submarine to land and back, he paddled a canoe. On the return trip this canoe capsized and the general lost his trousers in the rescue. He was known by many as the general who lost his pants in a daring submarine expedition. The entire mission, including the invasion, was a success and Mark Clark was promoted to three-star general at age 46 - the youngest man to hold the rank up until that time.

In January 1943, Gen. Clark was designated commanding general of the Fifth Army, which he led from Salerno up the Italian Peninsula. The September 8, 1943, landing was the first time American troops set foot on the European continent during the conflict, but it was a very costly victory. He commanded the 15th Army group in Italy in the 1944-45 time period. Following the war he served as commander-in-chief of the U.S. occupation forces in Austria and was given the nickname, or title, of "Savior of Austria" by those under his surveillance. In 1952 he was the commanderin-chief of the United Nations Command in Korea and commanding general of all U.S. forces in the Far East. He retired on October 31, 1953, to accept the presidency of The Citadel, a military college in Charleston, S.C., and served as such until 1965. He died in that city at the age of 87 from cancer and liver and heart complications.

MARK WAYNE CLARK (Cont'd)

Bro. Mark Wayne Clark was initiated on November 18, passed on December 2 and raised on December 30, 1929, in Mystic Tie Lodge No. 398 at Indianapolis, Ind. He later affiliated with Hancock Lodge No. 11 at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

He received the 32° AASR in Indianapolis in 1930 and affiliated with the Scottish Rite in Fort Leavenworth in 1934. He later received the 33° when he returned to Indianapolis in 1946. In 1954 the Supreme Council AASR (NJ) presented him the Gourgas Medal, their highest decoration. It is in recognition of notably distinguished service in the cause of Freemasonry, humanity or country.

The patch of the 5th Army which Gen. Clark led in the advance through Italy is pictured on a Brazilian stamp issued in 1945 (Scott No. 635). This release can be used to head a page for Gen. Clark until the United States or some other country honors him with a stamp bearing his likeness.

RECENT FRENCH ISSUES

Bro. John M. Cunningham has provided a copy of two 1984 semi-postal issues of France which picture Freemasons as well as the following information on each brother pictured. Maximilien Paul Emile Littre is pictured on the stamp to the left while Jean Elie Paul Zay is shown on the one to the right.



Maximilien Paul Emile Littre

He was born in Paris on February 1, 1801, and died there on June 2, 1881. He was a French philosopher, writer and philosopher. He worked 40 years on the great dictionary of the French language, "Dictionnaire de la Langue Francaise". He became a follower of Auguste Comte, the "positivist" and was recognized as the head of this school of philosophy after the latter's death in 1857. He was elected to the French Academy in 1871 and became a life senator in 1875.


He received his Entered Apprentice degree along with Jules Ferry on July 8, 1875, in the presence of 2000 Brethren in Lodge "La Clemente Amitie" at Paris.

Jean Elie Paul Zay

He was born on August 6, 1904, at Orleans (Loiret) and died on June 22, 1944, at Cusset (Allier). He was a French lawyer, publisher and politician being a member of the National Assembly since 1932. He was Minister of Education from 1936 to 1939. He was an uncomprimising enemy of Nazism and during the regime of Petain he was arrested and murdered. His memoirs, "Souvenirs et Solitude", written during his imprisonment were published in 1946.

He received the Entered Apprentice degree on January 24, 1926, in Lodge "Etienne Dolet" at Orleans. He held several offices in this Lodge. -411-

MASONIC FANCY CANCELS



Before the availability of cancelling machines, postmasters were called upon to devise their own method of cancellation. One popular method was to carve designs out of cork, wood or hard rubber. Many postmasters had an artistic interest in their work and produced a variety of fancy cancels, some of which were Masonic symbols. The Masonic Square and Compasses was the most popular design; however, others such as the square, trowel and Fez have been found.

The album page to the left shows some of the types of cancels which do exist on 19th Century stamps. The covers below show that the practice was not limited to U.S. Postmasters but also extended to our Canadian neighbors. Some application of fancy cancels in the 20th Century can be found.

MASONIC POST CARDS

There have been some examples of Masonic Post Cards shown in previous issues of The Philatelic Freemason. Some more examples from the editor's collection are shown for your enjoyment. The "I'm One, too" is from the 1909 Ullman series while the "He's a Mason" was copyrighted in 1906 by W.H.Gallagher. The remaining card is done on leather.
