GONZALO DE QUESADA AROSTEOUI

Gonzalo de Quesada Arostequi was born in Havana, Cuba, on December 15, 1868. He was a convinced patriot and a favorite desciple and companion of the illustrious Cuban fighter for independence and Mason, José Marti. He was a well known author and is considered one of the most brilliant orators of his time. He stayed in the U.S.A. for a long time where he undertook the secretaryship of the "Partido Revolucionario Cubana". After the republic was established in Cuba in 1902, he became the first Ambassador to Washington and later to Berlin. He died in Berlin in 1915.

Gonzalo de Quesada was a member of the Lodge "La Fraternidad" No. 387 in New York City. This Lodge was founded in 1855 by Andres Cassard from Santiago, Cuba. Because of the numerous Cuban emigrants that were members of this Lodge, it soon became known as "The Cuban Lodge". The Lodge assembled periodically in the spacious and elegant Corinthian drawing-room of the German Masonic Temple building situated at Third Avenue and 15th Street in New York City.

Cuba dedicated a stamp to this great patriot in 1940, Scott No. 361. It commemorates the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Pan American Union.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

In conjunction with the upcoming election of officers, we should review the roles which are defined for these individuals within the Unit's By-Laws. It has been some time since these By-Laws were published (Oct/Nov 1982 newsletter) so they are cited below. The Unit officers - President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer - are elected for two year periods and are characterized as follows:

- President The president shall have general charge of the business and affairs of the Unit, shall preside at all meetings and shall appoint all committees authorized by the Board of Directors.
- Vice-President The Vice-President shall serve as an aide to the president and shall perform the duties of the president in his absence or inability to serve. He shall perform such additional duties as delegated to him by the president.
- Secretary-Treasurer The secretary-treasurer shall conduct correspondence relative to the welfare of the Unit and shall keep records of the member-ship and the Unit's activities and shall receive all monies in the name of the Unit and shall pay out monies authorized by proper voucher.

The appointed positions of the Unit are two Directors, Editor, Historian and Research Chairman; their functions are as follows:

- Directors Two Directors acting with the officers shall constitute the Board of Directors. Each Director has the responsibility to assume the duties given him by the president or vice-president. They will oversee the Historian and the Librarian (Research Chairman).
- Editor The Editor is appointed by the President and shall be designated on a bi-yearly basis.
- Historian The Historian is appointed by the president on a 2-year basis. He is responsible for the history of the Unit and its functions.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS (Cont'd)

Research Chairman - The Research Chairman is appointed by the president on a 2year basis and functions to answer questions that are asked of the Unit pertaining to Masonic Philately. He will also keep, maintain and make available for other members the Unit's research library (if one is ever compiled).

Representatives can also be appointed by the president to act as the Unit's personal touch in their immediate areas. They can give the Unit better exposure in local publications and can contact the secretaries of local Lodges and stamp clubs.

In response to the request for suggestions for the positions of President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer published in the latest newsletters, some nominations have been received. Dorothy Walker


Secretary-Treasurer Otto L. Steding (incumbent)



NORVELL HARDY (aka OLIVER HARDY)

The USPS has indicated that it will issue a commemorative to honor the famed "Laurel and Hardy" comedy team. Bro. Frank Cochrane has been among a large group of people who have written to anyone and everyone to promote this stamp for a number of years. He has provided us with some Masonic data on Bro. Hardy. He can find no record of Stan Laurel ever being a Mason. Bro. Hardy was born in 1892 and died in 1957.

According to the Secretary of Solomon Lodge No. 20, F&AM, of Jacksonville, Fla.,"Bro. Oliver Norvell Hardy made application for the degrees on March 20, 1916, he received his Entered Apprentice May 22, 1916, upon objection to be advanced, by a Past Master July 10, 1916, no reason given, Sept. 23, 1916, objection was withdrawn and he was passed to Fellowcraft Degree Sept. 25, 1916, and raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason Oct. 26, 1916."

Up until a few years ago anyone connected with the liquor business (salesman, bartender, tavern owner) could not petition a Masonic Lodge in the State of Florida. Some Lodges still use petitions with this question on them although it is now null and void. Before teaming up with Stan Laurel, Oliver Hardy made a number of films in Florida and in one he played the part of a drunk. This was reported to his Masonic Lodge and he had to appear in open Lodge and explain that he had been making a movie and was not in fact a public drunk. (Bro. Hardy told this story when he and Stan Laurel were on "This is your Life".) This may have been the reason for the objection by the Past Master.

MASONS ON FORTHCOMING 1986 US STAMPS

Hugo La Fayette Black - Born on Feb. 27, 1886 in Harlan, Ala. He received his LL.B. from the University of Alabama in 1906 and began practice in Birming-ham the next year. He was elected U.S. Senator from Ala. for two terms 1927-1937, was nominated associate justice of the Supreme Court by F. D. Roosevelt on Aug. 12, 1937, confirmed on Aug. 17 and took his seat on Oct. 4.

He was raised in Ashland Lodge No. 356, Ashland, Ala., in 1909. He later became a life member of Birmingham Temple Lodge No. 636. He was 32° AASR (SJ), K.T. and Shriner.

William Jennings Bryan - born March 18, 1860, in Salem, Ill. He was admitted to the bar in 1883 and began practice at Jacksonville, Ill., moving to Lincoln Nebr., in 1887. He was a member of the 52nd and 53rd Congresses, 1891-1895, from the first Nebr. District. He edited the Omaha World-Herald from 1894 to 1896. In 1896 he was nominated for President but was defeated by McKinley. This was repeated in 1900 and then by Taft in 1908. He was Colonel of the 3rd Nebr. regiment in the Spanish-American War. As Secretary of State in Wilson's Cabinet 1913 to 1915, he negotiated thirty treaties. He died on July 26, 1925, in Miami, Fla.

He was raised in Lincoln Lodge No. 19, Lincoln, Nebr., on April 15, 1902, and later affiliated with Temple Lodge No. 247, Miami, Fla.

Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington - Born in 1899, he moved to New York from his native Washington in 1923 and there continued to refine and present his music in a big band format. Radio broadcasts during his orchestra's 1927-1932 engagement at New York's fashionable Cotton Club brought the "Duke" and his orchestra international fame. His instrument was the piano, yet Ellington considered his incomparable orchestra to be the truest expression of his creative vision. He died in New York City in 1974.

He was a member of Social Lodge No. 1, Prince Hall Grand Lodge F.& A.M., of the District of Columbia.

Matthew A. Henson - Born Aug. 8, 1866, in Charles County, Md. He was associated with Robert Peary for 20 years and was with him when he reached the North Pole in 1909. Being the last survivor of this expedition, he died in 1955.

He was a member of Celestial Lodge No. 3, Prince Hall jurisdiction in New York City.

Elisha Kent Kane - Born Feb. 20, 1820, in Philadelphia, Pa., he was graduated from the University of Penna. in 1842 with a medical degree and entered the U.S. Navy on June 21, 1843, as assistant surgeon. He served in China, Africa and the Mediterranean and requested to be relieved of duty to accompany the DeHaven (Henry Grinnell) expedition to the Arctic as surgeon. He commanded the second such expedition in 1853-54. He died in Havana, Cuba, on Feb. 16, 1857.

He received all three degrees in Franklin Lodge No. 134, Philadelphia, Pa.. He was entertained at a reception by Saint John's Lodge, Newfoundland on June 17, 1853, and was presented a Masonic Flag. Kane Lodge No. 454 of New York City, the famous "explorers' lodge" is named for him.

MASONS ON FORTHCOMING 1986 US STAMPS (Cont'd)

Adolphus W. Greely - Born on March 27, 1844, at Newburyport, Mass. he served in the Civil War from private to major. After the war he rose to brigadier general and chief signal officer in 1887 and major general in 1906.

He constructed telegraph lines in Texas, Dakotas and Montana and conducted expeditions to the Polar sea. He died in 1935.

He was a member of St. Marks Lodge of Newburyport, Mass., and was knighted in Newburyport Commandery, K.T., on June 17, 1867. He was made an honorary member of Kane Lodge No. 454, New York City

DENVER MSC COVERS

Bro. J. N. Adams, member #440 of Denver, informs us that the Denver Masonic Stamp Club is very active and continues to issue Masonic covers. The latest of these is a series of three covers honoring the 100th Anniversary of three Colorado Lodges: Delta Lodge No. 62, Montrose Lodge No. 63 and Euclid Lodge No. 64. Shown below, these covers are available from him at 2685 So. Sherman St., Denver, Colo., 80210. for a cost of \$5.00 for the set of three.



Some of the covers issued over the years by the Denver MSC for various events/shows are still available from Bro. Adams at a cost of \$1.25 each. The cachet for each is the same as shown above; the commemorated events available are: ROMPEX 78, 82, 83, 84, 85 and the Grand Master Annual Visitation at Doric Lodge No. 25 on Aug. 14, 1982.

A NEW FIRST FOR MIRT

Back in the Jan/Feb 1985 Newsletter I mentioned that Bro. John A. Mirt might have issued a FDC for the Clara Barton stamp of Sept. 7, 1948. This would preced the Indian Centennial stamp FDC of Oct. 15, 1948, which I had thought to be his first. Bro. Adams of Denver has come to the forefront with a true copy of a FDC for that issue which proves it does exist. We are both still perplexed at the 1949 copyright date but perhaps he waited until that year to have the cachet printed.

MSU NO. 12 COVER - MARK TWAIN

JOHANN REINHOLD FORSTER

Bro. Wessel M. Lans informs us that the Falkland Islands issued a series of stamps which not only pictures Johann Georg Adam Forster but also his father, Johann Reinhold Forster, 1729-1798. He was a member of the Lodge "Zu den drei Degen" in Halle, Germany. He was W. M. of this Lodge in 1781.

MASONIC NEWS OF LIBERIA

Our Unit Vice-President, Bro. Joseph A. Walkes, Jr., has a letter from the Grand Lodge of the Republic of Liberia dated April 20, 1985, which states that the Liberian Leader Doe, in his Redemption Day speech made over nation-wide radio, lifted the ban which his military government imposed against Craft Masonry on April 12, 1980. He gave assurances that orders would be given to have all of the Masonic properties throughout the country returned back to the Freemasons. The squatters which were occupying the Grand Masonic Temple in Monrovia were moved out by the military government and contact has been reestablished with Prince Hall Masonry in the United States.

The following excerpts have been taken from Bro. Walkes new book about the Republic of Liberia and its Masonry before the coup. The stamps illustrated are pertinent to this history.

Unexpectedly on July 23, 1971, Prince Hall Masonry was to learn of the death of Pres. William V. S. Tubman of Liberia at a London Clinic. Vice-President William R. Tolbert was sworn in by Richard A. Henries, Speaker of the Liberia House and Grand Master of the Prince Mall Grand Lodge of the Republic of Liberia. In response to a telegram from Jno. G. Lewis, the new President responded by telegram:

"I acknowledge with thanks your expression of condolences on behalf of 260,000 Masonic Brothers sent to Mrs. Tubman and family, the people and Government of Liberia for the death of President Tubmam. Please convey to your several jurisdictions our appreciation of their thoughtfulness which made the burden of our painful loss more bearable by the comfort and courage. Your message of sympathy brought from so many Masonic brothers. We shall strive to continue to strengthen the world brotherhood which our fallen hero strove to achieve."

W. R. Tolbert

The inauguration of Pres. Tolbert drew representatives from 52 nations; also, 300 organizations from around the world sent delegates to the West African Republic. Mrs. Pat Nixon headed the official U. S. delegation and Pres. Nixon provided transportation for the 12,000 mile trip in two Air Force C-141 transport planes. Through the assistance of Jno. G. Lewis, the famed Grambling College Marching Band was invited to perform as part of the U. S. delegation and for that reason, the second C-141 was added.

Jno. G. Lewis headed a delegation of thirty third degree Prince Hall Freemasons to Monrovia to attend the inauguration. The Masonic delegation, the guests of Pres. Tolbert, attended all of the official affairs that were held in conjunction with the ceremonies. Lewis further advised that while there, he would review plans and facilities that would be used when the Supreme Council would hold its annual convocation in Liberia in October. 'We have been and we gladly accepted the invitation of the Illustrious Deputy of the


