

EMMANUEL JOSEPH SIEYES



France honored Emmanuel Joseph Sieyes with a Semi-postal stamp which was part of a set of six released on February 25, 1989.

Emmanuel Joseph Sieyes was born at Frejus, Southern France. on May 3, 1748. He was educated for the church at the Sorbonne; but while there he eagerly imbibed the teachings of Locke, Condillac and other political thinkers, in preference to theology. Nevertheless he entered the church and advanced until he became vicar-general and chancellor of the diocese of Chartres. At the crisis of 1788 when Necker asked for opinions as to the constitution of the estates, Sieyes wrote his celebrated pamphlet, "What is the Third Estate?". He was then elected the last (twentieth) of the deputies of Paris to the States General. Excluded from the Legislative Assembly by Robespierre's self-denying ordinance, he reappeared in the third National Assembly.

In 1795 he went on a diplomatic mission to The Hague and in May 1798 was plenipotentiary of France to the court of Berlin. In these missions he was skillful but he failed in his main objects. Following an attempt to define the perfect constitution (which was remodelled by Bonaparte) he retired from the post of provisional consul and entered the senate. He died in Paris on June 20, 1836.

Emmanuel Joseph Sieyes was a member of the Lodge "Les neuf Soeurs."



ALEXANDER HAMILTON - A MASON OR NOT?

A Bro. Browne, historian of St. George's Lodge #6 of Schenectady reports that on a visit to Master's Lodge #5 of Albany he had the priviledge of examining one of the Lodge's earliest visitor's books. One of the first entries was the signature of Alexander Hamilton, this visit was just a few months before his dueling death at the hands of Aaron Burr.

He also reports that he had found a list of brethren who were raised as transient members upon paying a service fee. This did not make them a member of St. George's Lodge and the list merely recorded the fact that they, Hamilton among them, had been raised. The peculiarly aberrant custom of raising Brothers as transient members probably sheds some light upon the clouded Masonic beginnings of such Revolutionary War figures as Marshall, Madison, Audubon, Hamilton and Thayer to name but a few.

Rear Admiral George Washington Baird, author of "Great Men who were Masons" wrote that Hamilton was mentioned on page 45 of the "Old Masonic Lodges of Pennsylvania" and on page 58 of the same tome is a note of Hamilton's subscription of a "sum of money" for the Lodge and on page 73 an account of his being raised to Master Mason on Dec. 16, 1777, in the Second Lodge of the Moderns.

Henry C. Clausen, 33 deg., on page 15 of his book, "Masons Who Helped Shape the Nation", groups Hamilton and Morris together as Masonic Brothers whose financial gentus helped finance the young government of our nation.

An interesting comment, forwarded by Callahan in his book, "Washington the Man and the Mason", states that when writing the book in 1913 a distinguished Grand Master of Virginia, still living at the time, told him that "years ago a highly esteemed Grand Secretary destroyed several barrels of manuscript and old records relating to the early history of the Fraternity, believing it to be worthless rubbish". (I'm sure that many well meaning officers of Lodges who lacked a sense of understanding of the place of history in the Craft have done equally horrendous acts of violence.)

What is even more interesting is a footnote on page 264 of Callahan's book: Ero. M. Delancey Haywood, Historian of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina, furnished Callahan with the names of eighty six prominent Revolutionary patriots who were members of the Craft from that Jurisdiction: F.G.M. John M. Carter of Maryland furnished nearly as many from his state, the Grand Secretary of Massachusetts about 200 and the Grand Secretary of New York, more than Massachusetts. When relating the existence of the Military Lodges during the eight years of the war, he states that only one remains extant - American Union Lodge and even it had a dark period until being revived at Marietta, Ohio. He cites several illustrious examples of known Masons whose original Lodges may never be known because of this transient nature of the Lodges - he mentions Alexander Hamilton, Lafayette and John Marshall. Later, on page 267, he relates "On the 27th of December 1779, American Union Lodge met at Morristown, N.J., for the festival of St. John." Present at that gathering were 67 Revolutionary Army Officers who are all named and among whom appears Alexander Hamilton. These records are Minutes of the Grand Lodge of Connecticutt.

Men such as Samuel T. Hauser, Gov. of Montana; Henry D. Washburn, General, U.S. Army; and William H. Jackson all of whom accompanied Grand Master Langford of Montana and Grand Secretary Cornelius Hedges on their exploration of Yellowstone Park are accepted as Masons. This acceptance is based upon Masonic recognition by Langford and Hedges yet there is no known Lodge affiliation for any of the three. Using similar thought processes why should we not afford the same significance to the existing written records.


We can recite many instances of men whose Masonic membership was either denied or accepted and subsequent research proved the original assumption to be in error. Why should we accept a statement made by Case and not the statements made by Callahan or Baird or Browne. If all the Masons whose membership still cannot be absolutely verified were deleted from Denslow's "10,000 Famous freemasons", the books would have to be renamed to something like "9,000 Famous Freemasons".



ELLIOTT COVERS FROM IRELAND


Bro. Frank H. Elliott, Member No. 124 of Ireland, has sent in the covers shown here which commemorate Masonic events in his homeland.

LINDEN FORBES SAMPSON BURNHAM



Linden Forbes Sampson Burnham read Law at the University of London from 1947, returned to British Guyana in 1949 and started a successful practice as a lawyer. He founded the left wing People's Progressive Party with Cheddi Jagan, the Marxist leader, and in 1955 founded another new party - The People's National Congress. He was elected Premier of Guyana in 1964 and his party has been in power since the Independence of that Nation. Starting in 1964, Burnham strove to make his country self-supporting, a sort of cooperative, socialist state where even the last vestiges of colonialism had to disappear. Things did not work out as he had planned. Prices of raw materials such as sugar, rice and bauxite which are plentiful in Guyana dropped in the world market causing economic problems for the new nation. These trends led to Guyana becoming one of the poorest countries of the Western Hemisphere.

On December 15, 1980, Linden F. S. Burnham was elected President; however, many people contended the election had been manipulated. He was sworn into office on January 18, 1981, as the first elected President of Guyana and was bestowed with far-reaching powers. On August 5, 1985, Bro. Burnham was hospitalized with acute hoarseness and the following day he died of a cardiac arrest during an operation on his throat. He was 62 years old.

Linden Forses Sampson Burnham was a member of the Lodge "English Mechanics" of the Frince Hall Jurisdiction.

V_P_PAIRICK PALMER & MASONIC POSICARDS

As mentioned in the previous Newsletter, I saw an article on our Vice President, Bro. Patrick Palmer, in Barr's Post Card News. I will excerpt from that article here because it is pertinent to our hobby.

"It was the summer of 1983 and I was biding my time at one of the large shopping malls in Miami that my wife likes to frequent. She holds a black belt in shopping and is a member of the Master Card Hall of Fame! Boredom had set in so I started brousing the mall and headed for one of my favorite hang-outs, the bookstore at the opposite end. Nearing the center of the mall I came upon an area where several rows of tables were erected, laden with what appeared to be shoe boxes full of items that people were pulling out and examining.

"Postcards!! Thousands upon thousands of picture postcards!!

"Of course I suffer from that incurable and often fatal disease of chronic collectivitus. Needless to say I was enthralled for the next hour or so... The deitiology bug was nibbling at my toes and I was fast becoming a new convert... So even though the bug was toying with me, it hadn't really sunk its fangs, not that is, until that exact moment I picked up a handful of postcards under the Fraternal category and discovered that sepia postcard with the photo of a kitten perched upon a square, with the square and compasses around its neck. That's when I felt the death grip and knew that I was hooked.

"That afternoon a new and exciting world was revealed to me. All other interests took a back seat and I dove into my new hobby with enthusiasm.


"Since that afternoon of discovery, I've bought and traded Masonic related postcards at every opportunity. As a result my collection has grown to a total of over 1900 different postcards. It encompasses Masonic, Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rite and Eastern Star postcards. Even the Order of Demolay and the Rainbow Girls are represented. As far as I know, no catalog or pricing guide of Masonic postcards exists. Hence, we Masonic deitiologists must, (if I may borrow a bit of airline phraseology) "Fly by the seats of our pants".

"As my collection grew, it became necessary to computerize in order to have an up-to-date and accumulating duplicates. I have categorized my collection by the following subjects:

- 1. Buildings Temples, homes, hospitals, etc.
- 2. Comical A wide selection which poke fun at the Fraternity.
- 3. Ceremonies Parades, funeral processions, cornerstone layings.
- 4. Square & Compasses Postcards which depict the Square & Compasses as its main theme.
- 5. Notices Meeting & dues notices, benevolent fund assessments.
- 6. Miscellaneous Catchall category for all others.

"Freemasonry has played an important part in my life, and now it has been enhanced by the rewarding hobby of collecting Masonic related postcards. I always watch the newspaper for an advertisement announcing the next postcard show. Then I offer to take my wife shopping. She always gives me a questioning look wondering about my ulterior motive, but being the shopping professional that she is, she always takes advantage of the offer. Once we're there, I completely amaze her by telling her to take her time. Then I amble over to the nearest dealer's table and start thumbing through the Fraternal catyegory."


ARTICLE BY DWIGHT D. SEALS


ITALIAN MASONIC COVER
