


NICANOR ABELARDO

On June 1, 1993, the Philippine Postal Corporation issued a set of se-tenant stamps to mark the birth centenary of five Great Filipinos. Bro. Nicanor Sta. Ana Abelardo is shown on the first stamp of the set.



Nicanor Abelardo, Father of the Philippine sonata, orchestra conductor, professor of music and composer, was born on February 7, 1893, in San Miguel de Mayumo, Bulacan. He died on March 21, 1934, at the age of 41 as a result of heart failure "due to alcholic causes".

He acquired his formal musical education at the Conservatory of Music of the University of the Philippines in 1916. His unusual musical talent was recognized with an appointment in 1919 as instructor of the Conservatory. In 1930 he received a grant from the University of the Philippines to pursue advanced musical studies at the Chicago Musical College.

His more than 200 musical compositions are a testamonial to his musical genius and express the true sentiments of the Philippine people. In 1920 when the mortal remains of Bro. Marcelo H. del Pilar, the Father of Philippine Masonry, were brought to Manila from Spain, he composed "Bunying M. H. del Pilar". In 1930 he composed "Himno Masonico" which won first prize in a contest sponsored by the Grand Lodge of the Philippines. He followed it with "March Triunfal" which he dedicated to Lodge Isla de Luzon No. 57 - his Mother Lodge. He was active in the Philippine Bodies A.A.S.R. which conferred upon him the 32nd degree.

KARL PHILIPP VON GONTARD

The Berlin Government issued a stamp on Jan. 15, 1981, to honor the 250th Anniversary of the birth of Bro. Karl Philipp von Gontard.

Kark Philipp von Gontard was born on January 13, 1731, in Mannheim. His was an ancient French family which had fled shortly after the massacre of St. Bartholomew and returned to its original residential area in the Dauphine after the Edict of Nantes was revoked. Originally, his father Alexander was in the service of the Kurfurst (Elector) Karl Philipp in Mannheim and the son was named after him. Margrave Friedrich offered him a better place and they moved to Bayreuth. In Bayreuth father Alexander was initiated on Nov. 16, 1741, in the Schloss Lodge of which the Margrave was Grand Master. He was a danc- ing-master by profession and wanted to educate his son to the same career. As a 14 year old boy Karl Philipp played as an extra with the Comedy Francaise but hardly two years later he had progressed to the role of "ballet master".


He gave up dancing in 1749 and was employed as "conducteur" by the Department of Court-Building. He turned out to have a marked gift for architecture and his accomplishments were so significant that at the age of 19 he was sent to Paris at the expense of the Margrave to study architecture. He studied under Jacques Francois Blondel and was well instructed in the classical ideas then prevalent. He made a study tour through The Netherlands and in 1752 returned to Bayreuth where he developed his own style and created a castle for the Margrave. He was appointed Inspector of the Royal Building Office and was sent on a study tour of Italy. He returned to the title of "Captain-Engineer" and became a teacher at the newly founded art school in Bayreuth in 1761. He designed many buildings in Bayreuth and following the Margrave's death in 1763, he was called to Berlin by King Frederick the Great. He practiced his art there for over 30 years and built edifices such as the Ancients- and Friendship Temple in the garden of Sans Souci, the Marble Palace, the two cathedral towers in the Gendarme Market and the King's colonnade. He was knighted in 1767 by the Emperor Joseph II and died on Sept. 23, 1791, in Breslau on his way to a Kurort.

Shortly before his departure to Paris in 1750 he was initiated in 'Stadtloge' ('City Lodge'). Since his father was a Freemason his youth was not seen as an obstacle. During the Winterfestival of St. John the Baptist in 1753, the 'Schlossloge' and the 'Stadtloge' in Bayreuth merged into the Lodge 'Zur Sonne'. A roll of this Lodge from the year 1762 mentions Philipp Gontard as a Master Mason under Number 103. -information and cover provided by Bro. 

MASONIC COVER FROM SPAIN

Bro. Juan Sabater Pie, member No. 243, of Ronda Guinardo 28 3<u>0</u> 1<u>a</u>, 08024 Barcelona, Spain, has provided this cover commemorating the Exposition "Spanish Masonry:Symbography & Iconography" recently held in Salamance, Spain. Copies of the cover can be obtained from him at a cost of \$3.00 each, postpaid. (The total issue was only 300 copies).



When Gen. Franco began the Civil War in 1936 against the democratic government of the Second Republic, one of his first decrees was to prohibit the Masonic Craft over the entire national territory. Lodges were closed and all Masonic documentation, utensils and regalia were confiscated, catalogued and grouped in one official place: The Historical National Archive of Salamanca of Communism and Freemasonry". During this period, and up to 1950, persecution was atrocious: many brethren were assassinated, others imprisoned - the more fortunate were able escape to other countries. Masonic records were destroyed by Franco's secret police and Masonic symbols found on gravestones were crossed out. Masonry essentially disappeared from Spain for more than 50 years and persecution continued until the early 1970s at which time Franco declared: "there are not any Masons in Spain now".

All the material which had been taken to the Historical National Archive of Salamanca serves to provide the most important documentation in existence about the Law of Repression against Masonry. At the time of the Civil War, there were about 5,000 Brethren in Spain but Franco opened up about 80,000 police filing cards of suspected Freemasons who were interrogated, tortured or pursued. Anyone who had liberal ideas, an intellectual tendency or different religious beliefs was suspected of being a Mason and a card was kept on him. Also in the same building is a fabulous collection of Masonic regalia with a complete Lodge set up; included are some lay-figures of Masons with the black hoods on their heads to hide their identity.

This Archive has been closed to the public for over 50 years with only historians allowed to enter for research purposes. In June of this year, an important part of the museum was opened to the public for the first time to show the treasures and curiosities which are contained therein. To commemorate this event, the philatelic group of Salamanca and some Spanish Masons prepared this interesting cancellation showing an old Past Master's jewel which exists in the museum.

MASONIC MAXIM CARDS

Collecting Masonic Maxim Cards is one of the latest "crazes". The card, stamp and cancel must all agree. It is quite a challenge to find cards which can be said to be Masonic in nature and meet all the requirements. A few examples are shown here:

The G. Washington card is not a true Maxim Card as a pane of stamps is used rather than a single. The Past Master's jewel in Walter Williams' portrait is covered. Washington was sworn into the office of President in New York with his hand resting on a Masonic Bible so the postmark is significant.

The Bophuthatswana card shows the distinguished first Worshipful Master of Quatour Coronati Lodge No. 2076. Can any of our English brethren identify the medals?

The French Goethe card is another "triple" Maximum Card. Unfortunately, the stamp has no Masonic symbols.

The Grande Orient card was prepared for the stamp so it may not be a true maxim. It is slightly larger than the 4" permitted. It has a rare Masonic cancel which almost makes it a "triple".

Antoine De Mailly (1742-1819) was a secretary to Voltaire, member of the National Convention in 1792. This is a good example of a special cancel.





The covers shown here were published by Bro. Edsel Hatfield, member No. 21, P.O. Box 36, Hazelwood, MO 63042 and can be purchased from him





GRACE COOLIDGE

A special cancel was provided for the Coolidge Station, Burlington, VT, on July 8 of this year - it honors Grace Coolidge on her death anniversary.



Grace Anna Goodhue was born in Burlington, VT, on Jan. 3, 1879, and died in Northampton, MA on July 8, 1957. She married Calvin Coolidge on Oct. 4, 1905, and they had two sons: John and Calvin. She was a graduate of the University of Vermont and taught at the School for the Deaf in Northampton, MA.

Grace Coolidge was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Her son John was raised in Wyllys Lodge No. 99, West Hartford, CT, on Oct. 18, 1944. Calvin Coolidge was not a Mason.


BROTHERS OF THE DIAMOND



ISRAEL SPECIAL CANCEL

There has been no stamp of Israel dedicated to Freemasonry. However, Israel Postal Authorities have honored the Craft by issuing commemorative postmarks on five occasions. Four of these have been highlighted in various articles, the 5th is shown here. It was issued on the occasion of the Consecration of the Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the State of Israel. This event took place in the Halls of the Y. M. H. A. in Jerusalem on April 29, 1969.



October 1993 will mark the 40th Anniversary of the Consecration of the Grand Lodge of the State of Israel. There will be a special meeting held in conjunction with this event in which brethren will participate along with their wives and important political personnages including the president of the State of Israel. For this occasion the Grand Lodge will issue a special cover and the Israel Postal Authorities are going to prepare a commemorative postmark. A copy of the cover is shown here; it is possible that the logo of the 40th Anniversary will be printed on the envelope. The stamp to be used is the 0.80 shegel (80 agourst) stamp of the archeology in Israel set issued in June 1989; the tab of the stamp depicts the hammer and the chisel, two of the tools of our Craft.



Bro. Joseph Ashkenazi, Member No. 330, P.O. Box 4670, Haifa, Israel, is quite willing to be able to obtain these upcoming covers and would make them available to us. BRO. JAMES GRANT AND THE GRANTSBORORO POST OFFICE

Many of us have used Scott 645, Washington Praying in the snow at Valley Forge, to illustrate a point about the Craft and the nation's first president. A more direct tie to the Craft exists to the scene, and one with a postal history aspect. According to Dr. Miller McDonald (ref. 1) Sergeant James Grant, Washington's orderly, followed him into the woods around Valley Forge. Grant saw Washington kneel in the snow and begin to pray to his Creator for the necessities to feed and clothe his hungry, ragged troops. Soon enough, provisions arrived, ameliorating to some degree the suffering of the troops.

James Grant, of Old Saybrook, CT, joined the Continentals at Bunker Hill and served until Yorktown. After the War, he migrated to North Carolina where he met Stockley Donelson, the great land speculator and brother-in-law to Andrew Jackson, later Tennessee's Grand Master. Donelson employed Grant as one of the surveyors of the 200,000 acre Henderson and Company land grant. Later, Jackson would prosecute his brother-in-law's associates for land fraud related to selling claims in the Henderson Tract.

Grant became employed by George Roulstone, printer of the <u>Knoxville</u> <u>Gazette</u> and first postmaster of Knoxville, TN. (ref. 2) He may have ridden post as McDonald indicates he carried the letter to the Indian Commissioner at Tellico blockhouse that was forwarded to Washington that implicated Sen. William Blount; Blount was impeached and removed, the first US official to do so.







The first indication of Masonic activity in the Old Southwest Territory is a notice in the <u>Gazette</u> (ref. 3) but the first Lodge was warranted on Nov. 30, 1800, with John Sevier, governor, as Worshipful Master, and James Grant as Senior Warden (references seem to vary: the Lodge was located either at Nashville or Knoxville, under the authority of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina). The Special Collections of the University of Tennessee Library holds a letter dated June 12, 1796, from Washington to Grant. With the letter, Washington sent Grant a silver disk inscribed with the Square, Compasses, Columns and other emblems of the Craft (above). There is no indication of Grant's Mother Lodge and it may well have been the American Union Military Lodge.

In Dec. 1798 the Tennessee Legislature granted a charter to James Grant and others to locate a town at the confluence of the Powell and Clinch rivers. Grant reputedly was influenced by the layout of Philadelphia in laying out Grantsborough with the streets named Front, Vine, Chestnut and Main. Grant participated in the formation of Campbell County, Tennessee, in 1806 and served as clerk of the court, 1806-1810. He died at Grantsborough on Jan. 31, 1824, in his 71st year. His last words were of "The General", George Washington.



BRO. JAMES GRANT (CONTD)

Grantsboro received a post office on May 18, 1839, with James Hamilton Grant, the elder Grant's son, as postmaster. This office was discontinued on July 25, 1856. A post office was reestablished at Grantsboro on Dec. 26, 1882, and renamed Agee, for James H. Agee, a state senator and father of Nobel laureate novelist James Agee. This office was discontinued on Jan. 31, 1917, with postal service provided from nearby LaFollette.

The post office building at Agee was built as the home of Stooksbury Lodge No. 602, warranted April 2, 1898. This sufficed until the Lodge constructed a new home in 1921. In 1935 the Tennessee Valley Authority purchased the site, the Lodge was moved to higher ground and the location was inundated by Norris Lake.






MASONIC SEALS

CECIL BLOUNT DEMILLE

Bro. Cecil Blount DeMille is shown on a new issue from Guyana.

Cecil B. DeMille was born Aug. 12, 1881, in Ashfield, MA, and died Jan. 21, 1959, in Hollywood. He attended Pennsylvania Military College and the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. After a successful career as an actor and playwright (Alice of Old Vincennes, The Warrens of Virginia) he began directing films in Hollywood with Jesse Lasky and Sam Goldwyn. The first of these was "The Squaw Man" 1913 with Dustin Farnham. Other silent films included: "Carmen" 1915 with Geraldine Farrar, "The Cheat" 1915 with Sessue Hayakawa, "The Little American" 1917 with Mary Pickford, "Male and Female" 1919 with Gloria Swanson, "The Ten Commandments" 1923 with Theodore Roberts and "The King of Kings"" 1926 with H.B. Warner. In 1902 he married actress Constance Adams and they had one daughter, Cecelia. He owned the Mercury Aviation Company from 1918 to 1923 which was the first commercial airline. From 1936 to 1945 he hosted Lux Radio Theatre. His sound films started with "Dynamite" in 1929 and ran through to "The Greatest Show on Earth" in 1951 and "The Ten Commandments" in 1956.

Bro. DeMille was a member of Prince of Orange Lodge No. 16, New York, and Al Malaikah Shrine, Los Angeles.

NEW ISSUES HIGHLIGHTED

Bro. Thomas C. Ehlers, member no. 118 of Spokane, WA, offers the following comments on recent new issues - some of which have been illustrated in previous issues of this Newsletter.

On page 1032 there is a block of Guyana stamps that show Chester Conklin on a movie poster. the stamp immediately above the Conklin stamp shows Richard Dix on the Cimarron poster. Bro. Dix (Ernest Carlton Brimmer) waas featured on page 913 of the Newsletter on a cover by Edsel.

Also in the same series is a poster of the movie "A Sainted Devil" which bears the name, upon close inspection, of Bro. Adolph Zukor of Centennial Lodge No. 763 of New York City. The \$8.90 value of that series shows Bro. Tom Mix.

In 1986 Gambia issued a set of stamps showing famous immigrants and the Statue of Liberty. The 20b value shows Bro. John Jacob Astor, financier and founder of the town of Astoria, Oregon. He was one of the first members of Holland Lodge No. 8, New York City, and served as Worshipful Master in 1788. He was Grand Treasurer of The Grand Lodge of New York from 1798 to 1801 and served as Junior Grand Warden pro tem on two occasions in 1798 and 1801. For a time he was Secretary of a Commandery that met in Holland Lodge room at 66 Liberty St., New York City.



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

PAUL ROBESON

Paul Robeson, pictured on a new issue from Guyana, was born in Princeton, NJ, April 9, 1898. He earned a BA at Rutgers where he was a Phi Beta Kappa and received 15 varsity letters in track, baseball, basketball and football. He was selected an All-American at end by Walter Camp. After receiving an LLB from Columbia he passed the bar exam but decided to go into acting. He starred in two plays by Eugene O'Neill "All God's Children Got Wings" 1924 and "The Emperor Jones" 1925. He recorded many spirituals for Victor Records and appeared in films such as "Showboat" 1936, "Sanders of the River" 1935 and "King Solomon's Mines" 1937. In 1943 he was acclaimed for his performance as "Otello". He died in 1976.



HAROLD LLOYD Bro. Norm Lincoln has forwarded a copy of a special cancel applied at Long Beach, CA, on Aug. 14, 1993 for Moviemaking and to honor Bro. Harold Lloyd (1893-1993). This star of silent films went on to be a movie producer; he starred in more than 250 comedies. Bro. Lloyd was initiated in Alexander Hamilton Lodge No. 535 of Hollywood in 1925. In 1949 he was elected Imperial Potentate of the Shrine for North America.





The Winter 1993 issue of the International DeMolay Alumni Association Newsletter states that Pres. William Clinton joined Hot Springs Chapter, Order of DeMolay, in Arkansas in 1961. He learned the Flower Talk as well as his assigned ritual. He received the Legion of Honor in 1979 and was inducted into the DeMolay Hall of Fame in 1988.


The Corowa Conference was an important landmark in the Australian Federation movement and was held in the New South Wales town of that name. From as early as the 1850s people had been suggesting that the Australian colonies form a federation and the momentum gathered over the next 30 years enabled Sir Henry Parkes to move to establish a Federal Council at the 1880 Intercolonial Conference. In Aug. 1893, 72 delegates attended a conference at the town of Corowa on the New South Wales side of the River Murray - symbolic because the Murray was the border between the two most populous colonies. During this conference Dr. Quick, a founding member of the Australian Natives Association, set the tone for a further series of conferences which led to Federation in 1901. He died on June 17, 1932.

Bro. John Quick affiliated with Zenith Lodge No. 52, Victoria Constitution, in Bendigo. This Lodge was formerly Judah Lodge No. 388, Scottish Constitution. He was invested as Junior Warden on June 30, 1897, Senior Warden on July 29, 1898, and installed as Master on June 28, 1899.

ROBERT BURNS AND FREEMASONRY

Ayrshire in general and Kilwinning in particular have played a major part in the development of Freemasonry both in Scotland and abroad. Daughter Lodges of Kilwinning combined that name with their own. Tarbolton Kilwinning Lodge was warranted in 1771 for the sum of One Merk Scots but by 1773 there existed differences of opinions amongst the brethren which led to a group breaking away from their Mother Lodge. Twenty brethren led by Sir Thomas Wallace, Bart, petitioned the Grand Lodge of Scotland for a Charter which was granted on Feb. 26, 1773, as Lodge St. David No. 174 on the G.L. Roll. The remaining members of the original Lodge affiliated with Grand Lodge on May 27, 1774 becoming St. James Tarbolton Kilwinning No. 178.

In 1781 the minute book kept by Lodge St. David reveals the two Tarbolton Lodges effected a "junchen". This union came into effect on June 25, 1781, and retained the name of St. David which was older by charter and ignored the fact that Lodge St. James was by far the senior. This decision, by accident or design, prepared the way for dissention among the brethren.

Nine days after the "junchen" Robert Burns was entered as a member of the combined Lodge St. David. This Lodge minute for July 4, 1781, merely states that "Robert Burns of Lochly was entered as Apprentice". His entry fee of 12s 6d was paid on the same date. The next meeting of the Lodge was Oct. 1, 1781, and Robert travelled the 12 miles from Irvine for it. The importance of this meeting for Robert is revealed in the minute book. "Robert Burns in Lochly was Passed and Raised, Henry Cowan being Master, James Humphrey Senior Warden and Alex Smith Junior Warden, Robert Wodrow Secretary and James Manson, Treasurer and John Tannoch Tyler and others of the brethren being present."

Robert Wodrow, the Lodge Secretary, played a major part in the break up of the combined Lodge. He and Manson had been leading members of the older St. James Lodge and had been unhappy at the loss of that name to the gaining of St. David.

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The Lodge met in one of the rooms of the public house kept by John Richards. Bro. Richards kept the Charter Chest of the Lodge which included the minute books, archives and other belongings. One evening Wodrow and Capt. James Montgomerie called on John Richards, sent him off to Manson's Inn on some pretext errand, and in his absence removed the effects of Lodge St. James from the chest prior to his return. Proceedings at Ayr Sheriff Court followed and the matter was finally referred to Grand Lodge in Edinburgh. The Grand Committee ordered Wodrow to return the property but he refused. Finally, Sheriff Wallace ruled that as the Union was voluntary so could the separation be. The St. James Minute Book contains the entry "Torbolton June 17, 1782, St. James Lodge met upon the same footing as it was before the junction, James Montgomerie, GR. MR for the night."

Robert Burns followed the seceders but not until July 27, 1784, does his name feature in the minutes. At that meeting held in Manson's Inn, -1085-

to where the Lodge had moved, he was elected Depute Master of St. James. The Minute Book contains three minutes in Robert's handwriting beginning with the meeting of Sept. 1, 1784. Twenty nine Minutes were signed by Robert in his capacity as Depute Master and they are of particular interest pinpointing the date at which he changed the spelling of his surname. Prior to March 1, 1786, they are signed "Robt Burness" but on that date his brother Gilbert got his Second and Third Degrees in the Lodge and both signed "Burns".


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The minutes for the meeting of Canongate Kilwinning Lodge No. 2 on Feb. 1, 1787, record that Robert Burns was entered as an apprentice. "The RWM having observed that Bro. Burns was at present in the Lodge, who is well known as a great Poetic Writer, and for a late publication of his works, which had been universally commended, submitted that he should be assigned a Member of this Lodge, which was unanimously agreed to and he was assumed accordingly."

On May 19, 1787, the records of St. Ebbe's Lodge, Eyemouth, show that: "At a General Encapment held this day the following brethren were made Royal Arch Masons namely, Robert Burns from the Lodge of St. James Tarbolton, Ayrshire and Robert Ainslie from the Lodge of St. Luke's, Edinburgh. Robert Ainslie paid one guinea admission dues but on account of Robert Burns remarkable poetical genius, the Encapment unanimously agreed to admit him gratis and considered themselves honoured by having a man of such shining abilities for one of their Companions."

Very little is known of Robert's Masonic activities after he left Ayrshire. It is recorded that he joined the St. Andrews Lodge, Dumfries on Dec. 27, 1791 and was elected Senior Warden on Nov. 30, 1792. Throughout his life he suffered from ill health but he was well enough to attend St. Andrews Lodge on Jan. 28, 1796 and again on April 14, 1796. He died on July 21, 1796.

Robert Burns was the first Scotsman to be featured on a British stamp as well as the first Scottish Freemason and Royal Arch Freemason.



This cover commemorates the 250th Anniversary of Stirling Rock Royal Arch Chapter No. 2, Stirling. The first Minute of the initial Stirling Masonic organization was recorded on July 30th, 1743: "Which day the Lodge of Stirling Kilwinning being met in the Brother Hutchinson's House, and being petitioned by Mungo Nicol, Shoemaker and Brother James McEwan, Student of Divinity at Stirling, and being found qualified, they were admitted Royal Arch Masons of this Lodge, having paid their dues to the Treasurer. John Callendar, RWM" -1086-

The Lodge of Stirling Kilwinning still exists today as Lodge Ancient Stirling No. 30 on the Roll of the Grand Lodge of Scotland and meets in the Masonic Temple, Forth Street, Stirling. Stirling Rock Royal Arch Chapter No. 2 hold their meetings in the above Temple and retain strong links with Lodge Ancient Stirling No. 30.

THOMAS TELFORD AND FREEMASONRY

The stamp commorating the 200th Anniversary of the Grand Union Canal used on this cover also has some Masonic applicability. One of the most famous of canal builders was the Scotsman Thomas Telford and in his biography it is stated that in the early 1800s he was associated with the Grand Union Canal; no details are offered.


Thomas Telford was an apprentice stone mason in Langhorn and his Mason's Mark can still be seen on the bridge he helped to build over the River Esk. He moved to London in 1782 then on to Portsmouth where, on Dec. 17, 1784, at the age of 26, he was made a Freemason in the Lodge at the Three Tuns. This Lodge was warranted in 1724 and first met at the East India Arms, Gosport. It was later named Lodge of Antiquity but did not survive and eight of its members, including Telford, petitioned to form a new Lodge to be named Phoenix so that "We might rise again from the ashes of our Lodge to become worthy Masons". Phoenix Lodge, now No. 257, was warranted in 1786 and held its first meeting at the George Inn, Portsmouth in that same year. In a letter to a friend Telford wrote "I am taking a great delight in Freemasonry and am about to have a Lodge room at the George Inn fitted up after my own plans and under my direction".

Telford later went to Shrewsbury where he was one of the first joining members of Salopian Lodge now No. 262. This Lodge was constituted in 1788 by Major Charles Shirreff, a strong adherent to the antients ritual, under the premier Grand Lodge but it used some antient practices such as the offices of Deacon and the observance of both Festivals of St. John. His name is commemorated by Thomas Telford Lodge No. 8029, Wolverhampton and its Royal Arch Chapter.
