# THE PRESIDENT SPEAKS TAKE ME OUT TO THE BALL GAME

Baseball is a popular topic for stamp collectors, though perhaps less so after last year's strike. A large number of Masons are associated with the sport including Alexander Joy Cartwright, a member of Lodge Le Progress de l'Oceanie, later Worshipful Master of Hawaiian Lodge No. 21, considered the father of baseball and Aaron B. Champion, a



member of Lafayette Lodge No. 81, Cincinnati, OH, the president of the 1869 Cincinnati Red Stockings, the first professional team.

Baseball had produced its own mythology from "Casey at the Bat" (recited for 30 years in vaudeville by De Wolf Hopper of Pacific Lodge No. 233, N.Y.), and the "Who's on First" routine immortalized by Bud Abbott (Daylight Lodge No. 525, Detroit) and Lou Costello in burlesque and radio to Babe Ruth's "called shot" in the 1932 World series off Bro. Charlie Root (Cornerstone Lodge No. 875, Chicago). It also has its own official song which was written by a Mason who had never seen a professional game!

Albert Von Tilzer (born Albert Gumm) was born in Indianapolis, March 29, 1878, and died Oct. 1, 1956, in Los Angeles. His four brothers Harry, Julie, Will and Jack were all in the music publishing business. He tried arranging in Chicago but gave it up to be a shoe salesman. In 1903 he moved to New York and began writing the first of over 500 songs. Among them were "Put Your Arms Around Me, Honey" (1910) and "I'll Be With You In Apple Blossom Time" (1920). "Take Me Out To The Ball Game" was written in 1908; it has become almost a folk classic. It was first recorded by Billy Murray. In 1939 during the baseball "Centennial", Frankie Masters and his band had a big hit with it. It was sung in the movie of the same name in 1949 by Frank Sinatra, Gene Kelly and Jules Munschin. Albert was raised in St. Cecile Lodge No. 568, New York, on March 21, 1905.

Even if you have no interest in baseball, you can still appreciate how it has been influenced by Masons over the years. Unfortunately, there are few, if any, Brethren in the professional ranks today. Maybe, just maybe, that's one of the reasons for the decline of the sport. Masonic principles no longer motivate people in the public eye. Too bad.

# PRESIDENT JOHN QUINCY ADAMS AND FREEMASONRY

There was no important issue to be debated during the Presidential campaign of 1824. There were four candidates for the Presidency, one of them being John Quincy Adams, son of the second President - John Adams. The others were very prominent men - especially Andrew Jackson who was elected president four years later, defeating Adams who sought re-election. The slate was rounded out with Henry Clay who proved to be unsuccessful on three occasions, and William H. Crawford. One odd fact of the 1824 election was that all four candidates were members of the same political party, Democratic Republican. That party was soon dissolved and a new party, calling itself "Democratic", was formed. With the electoral vote being divided among four candidates, even though Adams received the majority, it was not enough for him to be elected. The election went into the House of Representatives as provided in the Constitution and he was elected there.

The country experienced a wave of anti-Masonry in the early 1820s. No doubt there was some basis for the hostility for the Fraternity had undergone substantial growth in the first two decades of the new century. Just how justified were the charges that Masons enjoyed favorable decisions from judges who belonged to the order, as well as favorable decisions taxwise, may or may not be true; but Masons were attacked not only in print, but in fact as well. Many Masonic Lodges were destroyed - several by fire. Halfway through the Adams term, the worst bit of violence struck the Fraternity. In 1826, William Morgan of Batavia, N.Y., commenced his campaign to destroy Masonry. He became a Mason, learned all the rituals, the sacred expressions, the secrets and the individual means to establish his identity with other members of the Craft, His pocket-sized illustrated expose appeared in 1827; the 98 page booklet is still available today in some used book stores. The old fable of Masons buying as many as they could find and burning them is probably not true.


In later years, on Nov. 2, 1838, Pres. Adams documented his feelings about the Fraternity in a letter to John Fellows, Esq., of New York:

"Accept my thanks for your obliging letter, dated September last, and which I duly received together with a very learned work upon the Mysteries of the Ancient Egyptians, Pythagoreans and Druids, and inquiring into the origin, History and Purport of Free Masonry--

"Considering the institution of Free Masonry as founded upon Imposture, Historical, Religious, Moral and Political, every historical research relating to it becomes interesting to me — because no honest enquirer after truth can come to any other conclusion concerning it — that the only means of wiping away the stain at present attached to the Society, is a total abandonment of the Oaths. I am happy to find this is your unequivocal opinion, as the Oaths are the vital part of the Institution, I trust the good sense of its ministers will at no distant day induce them to abandon with the Oaths, the whole system of fantastical absurdities connected with them."

Pres. Adams' term ended with the election of 1828 when he lost to Andrew Jackson, a Mason. In 1831 he was elected to Congress, serving until suffering a stroke at his seat in Congress and dying soon thereafter in the Speaker's Room.

The cover shown to the left offers a fascinating look into the past of a Lodge formed in the days of gold mining in California. A rather nondescript 3 cent stamped envelope (Scott U82), Reay issue of 1870-71, postmarked June 30, San Francisco, and addressed to: "Geo. H. Roelke, Esq. Sec. of Violet Lodge No. 138 F. & A. Masons At Spanish Flat

El Dorado Co., Cal." with the return address of

"Alex. G. Abell/Grand Sec. F. & A.Ma., San Francisco, Cal." Along with the envelope, but not part of it are two more interesting items. One is a forwarding receipt of Wells, Fargo & Co. Express dated August 17. 1875, for receipt at Placerville of \$27.00 (in coin) from G.H.Roelke addressed to Alex. G. Abell, San Francisco. The second is a receipt from the Grand Lodge of California dated August 19, 1875, for the \$27.00 received from Violet Lodge No. 138 for Grand Lodge dues signed by the Grand Lodge Secretary, Alex. G. Abell.

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Correspondence with the Grand Lodge of California produced some interesting facts about this Lodge. According to "One Hundred Years of Freemasonry in California" (by Leon Whitsell) after Benjamin Kelsey opened the rich El Dorado diggings in 1848 a number of neighboring camps with odd names soon appeared, including "Spanish Flat". This camp had something of an urban characteristic until well into the 1880s. On July 30, 1859, the Grand Master issued a dispensation for opening a Masonic Lodge at Spanish Flat with its charter citing Violet Lodge No. 138, dated May 10, 1860. In 1862 the Lodge had 24 members with membership slowly diminishing as the mining declined. Finally, some of the 15 remaining members surrendered their charter on August 29, 1879. Consequently, Violet Lodge No. 138 existed for only 19 years it was declared extinct by the Grand Lodge on October 16, 1879.

A Review of the reports of Subordinate Lodges to Grand Lodge for the years 1860-1879 showed Violet Lodge No. 138 met on the "Tuesday of or next preceeding the Full Moon" from 1860 to 1873 when the meeting was changed to the "Friday of or next preceeding the Full Moon" for the rest of its existence. The same reports show that George Herman Roelke was a Fellowcraft Mason in 1872 and was appointed Senior Deacon the following year serving in that position in 1874 also. In 1875 he was elected Secretary of the Lodge and continued as such until 1878. In the final year of the Lodge's existence, he was appointed Junior Deacon. These terms identify that the envelope shown above was posted sometime diring the 1875-78 time frame.

While the value of this envelope and the two receipts is minimal, their importance as heritage items of a Masonic Lodge meeting during the gold mining days in California gives them special meaning to the Fraternity. It tells us that even in the days when gold and silver were the dominating values of the average man, for some there existed the values of the Masonic Fraternity which overshadowed the day-to-day life. This was demonstrated in the gold mining town of Spanish Flat by the meetings of Violet Lodge No. 138, F. & A.M. of the Grand Lodge of California.

# LUIS ALBERTO PARDO VILLALON



Luis Alberto Pardo was born August 25, 1883, in Santiago, Chile and died there on May 30, 1935. He was a marine officer and pilot in Chile and is shown on a stamp issued by that country in January 1967 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the rescue of the Shackleton South Pole expedition by Capt. Luis Fardo (Scott No. 361). As commanding officer of the "Yelcho", Pro. Pardo rescued the

crew of the "Endurance" who had been marooned on Elephant Island (1916) during the ill-fated expedition of the Weddell Sea. The King of England presented Bro. Pardo with 20,000 pounds sterling but Pardo refused the gift.

# SHAIKH MOHAMMED ABDO

Mohammed Abdo was born in Beneden, Egypt in 1849 or 1850 and died in Cairo on July 77, 1905. The 60th anniversary of the death of Abdo, Mufti of Egypt, was commemorated by a stamp (Scott No. 669) released by Egypt on July 11, 1965.

# SIR GEORGE COCKBURN



Sir George Cockburn was included with Viscount Horatio Nelson in a stamp released by Turks & Caicos Islands on April 17, 1985; as a salute to the Royal Navy. This British Naval Admiral was born April 22, 1772, in London and entered the navy at the age of 9. He became a rear admiral in 1812 and was responsible for the burning of the U.S. White House in 1814. He died on August 19, 1853.

Bro. Cockburn was made a member of Royal Somerset House and Inverness Lodge No. 4, London, on Nov. 25, 1811, and in 1812 was admitted to the Lodge of Antiquity No. 2, London.

#### SAMUEL DEXTER

An American jurist and statesman, Samuel Dexter was born in Boston, MA, on May 14, 1761. He was admitted to the bar in 1784, attached himself to the Federalist Party and was elected a Senator in 1798. President John Adams appointed him Secretary of War in 1800 and Secretary of the Treasury early in 1801. With the accession to the presidency of Thomas Jefferson in 1801, Dexter withdrew from public service and resumed the practice of law in Boston. He had no superior v and few equals as an advocate before the U.S. Supreme Court, As a supporter of the war against Britain, contrary to most of his New England contemporaries who began a secession movement over the issue, he separated from the Federalists in 1812. He died on May 4, 1816.

Samuel Dexter published "Letter on Freemasonry", "Progress of Science" and "Speeches and Folitical Papers". Although this publication would imply a relationship with the Fraternity, there do not appear to be any conclusive facts either for or against his membership. Can any of our readers provide any data on this possible case?

His portrait appears on the U.S. 3 cent documentary stamps issued since 1940 and the 3 cent silver tax issue of 1941.

The Philippines issued a souvenir sheet on June 12, 1995, with four stamps to commemorate the 1872 Cavite Mutiny. One value depicts Bro. Crisanto De Los Reyes y Mendoza, a Chinese meslizo from Quiapo, who was a businessman by profession. He supplied the Arsenal de Cavite with goods such as iron nails, pipes, shears, screws, oil cans, tubes, locks, faucets, canvasses and varnish which he imported from England. A military court found De Los Reyes guilty of

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conspiracy and rebellion for which it sentenced him to ten years of incarceration. Captain General Rafael de Izquierdo ordered him to serve his prison sentence in far-off Cartagens, Spain, as De Los Reyes' assistance in facilitating the mutiny and his membership in a Masonic Lodge made him a threat to the political stability of the Philippines. Pardoned in 1876, he returned to the Philippines the next year and stayed there until he died on July 4, 1895. (Bro. Carlos Inductivo, P.O. 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# KING WILLIAM III

At the bottom left is a cancellation proving that the card was "vervoerd naar Engeland" (transported to England) together with a deputation of Prothers from a Dutch Lodge.



# MEETING NOTICE FOR WAUKESH'A LODGE NO. 37

When collecting U.S. postal cards the address side/front may establish the variety but the message side/back more often offers insight into Americana. One of my favorites are those postal cards relating to the Masonic Fraternity - a category with not a lot of material. In the case shown, the message side of a first issue 1 cent postal card (Scott UX3) has a meeting notice for December 3, 1875, for Waukesha Lodge No. 37. It also bears an embossed colorless seal of the Lodge. Apparently in 1875 the practice of sending Lodge notices was to use a penny postal card but the use of a seal is not common. The notice was a summons to appear at the meeting for the election of officers - this may have been the reason for the use of the seal.






Through the kindness of the present W.M. of Waukesha Lodge, I was able to receive a copy of the minutes of that meeting which showed the results of the election. The meeting notice was signed by G. W. Smith, Secretary pro tem. As a result of the election, A. C. Nickell was elected Secretary with the Installation of Officers to be held on the first regular meeting in January 1876. The W.M. was also kind enough to provide some history on the Lodge itself. Dispensation was granted on January 10, 1851, in response to a petition by 11 members of Tracy Lodge No. 13 to open a Lodge in Waukesha, Wisc. The Charter was granted on June 9, 1852 and the Lodge acquired their own Temple in 1905. Several members of the Lodge served as Grand Master of the G.L. Wisconsin; others served notably during the Civil War; one was Governor of the State, Anbassador to Rome and Postmaster General. Other members were outstanding citizens of the State and Community.
