RICHARD EVELYN BYRD

Bro. Richard E. Byrd has been honored by the issuance of several stamps from countries all over the world. The most recent United States issue which pictures him is included in the Antarctic Explorers set released on September 14, 1988 (Scott No. 2388).



Commander Byrd was born in Winchester, VA, in 1888 and graduated from the Naval Academy at Annapolis in 1912. In 1926 Richard E. Byrd and Floyd Bennett set their sights on the North Pole taking off from Ny Alesund in a plane. In honor of this flight, he was promoted to the rank of Commander. In 1927, with three companions, he flew the first trans-Atlantic airmail from New York to Paris, Following his first expedition to Antarctica in 1929, during which he established Little America on the Bay of Whales, he was promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral by a special act of Congress and was honorably discharged. He made a second expedition to Antarctica in 1933-35 followed by one in 1939 and another in 1955-57. He was awarded three Special Congressional medals for his explorations and died on March 11, 1957.

Bro. Byrd was made a Mason in Federal Lodge No. 1, Washington, DC, in 1921, being raised on March 19. He affiliated with Kane Lodge No. 454 (The Explorer's Lodge) of New York City on September 18, 1928, Bernt Balchen stated that Richard E. Byrd dropped his Fez on the South Pole during his first expedition there. On his second Expedition, 60 of the 82 men on that trip were Masons and on February 5, 1933, they established First Antarctic Lodge No. 777 under New Zealand Constitution. He received the Distinguished Achievement Award of the Grand Lodge of New York in 1947.


MEMBERS ACTIVITIES:

LUTHER BURBANK

Luther Burbank is included in the Scientist's group of the Famous American Commemorative series of 1940. This three cent issue was released at Santa Rosa, CA, on April 17, 1940.



This world famous horticultural experimentalist was born March 7, 1849, at Lancaster, MA. His boyhood was spent on a farm and he was educated at local schools. At the age of 21 he purchased a plot of land near Lunenburg, MA, and began his life's work. After two years of experimentation, he developed a large, hardy variety of potato which revolutionized potato growing in America.

In 1875 he moved to Santa Rosa, CA, and established a nursery garden and greenhouse where he conducted his plant breeding experuiments for the next 50 years. He originated many improved varieties of fruits and vegetables, several new strains of roses and many other ornamental and decorative flowers and plants. He developed a new fruit called the "plumcot"; his spineless cactus provided a new feed for cattle. At the time of his death, April 11, 1926, he had more than 3,000 experiments under way and was growing 5,000 distinct botanical species native to many other parts of the world. He was buried in the Luther Burbank Memorial Gardens under a Cedar of Lebanon tree.

At the age of 72, after years of cooperating with the Great Architect of the Universe in creating abundance and beauty, Luther Burbank sought admission to Santa Rosa Lodge No. 57 on August 13, 1921. His concept of the Fraternity was so great that he became a member of the Scottish Rite and on October 20, 1925, he was made an Inspector General Honorary of the 33rd Degree. His name lives on Masonically for on Oct. 26, 1955, Luther Burbank Lodge No. 752 was chartered in Santa Rosa.


NATSCO COVER

SPECIAL MASONIC CANCEL




Dick Groat Autographed Cover Available

THE PRESIDENT'S PAGE THE BEGINNING OF AN ERA

This is the final Newsletter of the Twentieth Century of the Christian Era. (Except for certain mathematicians and purists) Although we can live through Y2K, fiew can comprehend two millenia. Little remains of that distant time but crumbling arches, decaying walls and eroding pyramids. Yet the works of Operative Masons have far outlived their ephemeral builders. Freemasonry is rich in symbols and parables taken from ancient and modern writings. Will the thoughts of Ecclesiates and the soliloguoy of Hamlet remain fixed in human memory? Will our collective race survive overpopulation, squandering of natural resources, pollution of the biosphere and xenophobia? Will Masons follow the Odd Fellows, the Knights of Pythias, the Woodmen, the Redmen, the Junior Order of Mechanics, the Druids, the Rosicrucians and a hundred other fraternal organizations which once flourished, but are now in decline? Predictions are hazardous at best. At the turn of the Twentieth Century with about a million and a half members, Masonry was about the same size as Odd Fellowship. The Elks, Moose and Eagles were providing competition as social clubs. Yet to come were the Rotarians, Optimists, Lions and Kiwanians, the Klan was inactive Fraternal bodies appealed to white, male, mature, affluent, native-born, educated Americans. The majority were Protestants, the Knights of Columbus for Roman Catholics was just getting underway. Irish and German immigrants were escaping the big city ghettos. Jews, Blacks, Orientals and Hispanics lacked a voice. Women were not yet empowered to vote. Two World Wars and a Great Depression were unforeseen. So were Civil Rights, Civil Disobedience, Nuclear Energy, Man on the Moon, Disneyland, Emmy Awards, Compact Discs, Flower Power and the Internet. Masonry grew, but then became old-fashioned. There are many theories as to the origin of Masonry and to its future Likewise, physicists believe the physical universe is evolving, and sociologists speculate on the derivation and mutation of our customs and relationships. So it is with Masonic scholars. The French have a saying: "The more things change, the more they remain the same." Masons living today will undoubtedly live to see the 21st Century. And Masons in 2009 will still complain about membership. Degrees will be confered on the Moon and Brethren will still argue about doing it the old way. And so it will go until a killer virus or a giant meteor or the expansion of the sun renders our species and its accomplishments extinct. Meanwhile, enjoy collecting Masonic stasmps. I do!

IRVING BERLIN

Bro. Irving Berlin has finally been honored on a postage stamp - one issued by The Gambia in 1998 as a Souvenir Sheet.

This noted song writer was a member of Munn Lodge No. 190, New York City, having received his degrees on May 10, May 26 and June 3, 1910. He became a Life Member of that Lodge on December 12, 1935. He became a member of the Valley of New York City, A.A.S.R., on December 23, 1910, and Mecca Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S., on January 1, 1911.



He was born as Israel Baline in Temum, Russia, May 11, 1888, one of eight children of Rabbi Moses and Leah Baline. The family settled in the USA in 1893 and he was educated in the New York City public schools. He began his musical career as a singing waiter in restaurants and cafes. In 1911, the composition of "Alexander's Ragtime Band" established his reputation as a song writer. He wrote music and lyrics for numerous musical comedies and revues. In 1942 he wrote and produced "This is the Army" using only Army personnel. In 1955 President D. D. Eisenhower presented Berlin with a special medal authorized by Congress for his composition of patriotic songs. He gave all the Royalties of several songs to help a Foundation to assist youth in "less chance areas". Mindful of the problems of song writers, he was a guiding light in the formation of ASCAP (the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers), organized to protect royalties under music copyrights.

GUISEPPE GARIBALDI ESCAPE FROM SAN MARINO

The previous Newsletter pictured a cover prepared by the Italian Masonic Stamp Club noting the escape of Bro. Garibaldi from San Marino in 1849. Bro. Gene Fricks has forwarded an article which explains the background behind the San Marino stamp on that FDC.

The Roman Republic of 1849 was overthrown after 6 months by a French force acting in concert with the forces of Austria, Spain and Naples to restore papal sovereignty. Defense of the city and republic was in the hands of Bro. Garibaldi who, on the fall of the Republic, forced his way through enemy lines with thousands of followers and began a perilous journey across Central Italy with the intention of going to the help of Venice. Closely pursued by Austrian troops, he sought refuge in the Republic of San Marino on 31 July 1849 but was forced to disband his group of followers in doing so. The Sammarinese authorities did everything possible for their unexpected guest but he preferred to slip away secretly that same night with just a few faithful adherents and his wife Anita down the slopes of Mount Titano. The stamp pictures the revolutionary crowds of the Roman Republic and Garibaldi, his wife and companions, against the outline of Mount Titano, based on an engraving by Lorusso.

SPORTS CARDS

Bro. Norman Lincoln sent in four reprints of Goudey Sport King Gum Cards of the 1930s. Bro. Jack Dempsey and Jimmy Doolittle have been honored by postage stamps and articles have appeared in previous issues of the Newsletter. Both Bro. Lincoln and your Editor seem to recall reading that Duke Kahanamoku, a noted swimmer, was also a Mason - as were many of the Royalty of his homeland. Bro. Holman was the President of the National Association of Basketball Coaches in 1941 and led the CCNY team to a national championship in 1950. He is a member of the Basketball Hall of Fame and was a member of Perfect Ashlar Lodge No. 604, New York.










A PHILATELIC FAVORITE

EDSEL MASONIC MEDAL OF HONOR COVERS

Bro. Edsel Hatfield, P.O. Box 36, Hazelwood, MO 63042 has recently published a number of covers in his Medal of Honor series to bring that set almost to completion. It has been a dedicated and exhaustive effort but will be appreciated by collectors and historians alike. Several covers from this latest selection are shown here.



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GEORGE M. BIBB

Bro. George M. Bibb, Secretary of the Treasury under Pres. Tyler is pictured on the \$5.00 stamp of the 1940 Document stamp series.

Wor. Bro. Bibb served as Worshipful Master of three Lodges: Russellville No. 17 (first Master), Hiram No. 1 (at Frankfort) and Lexington No. 1. He was a Past High Priest of Frankfort Chapter No. 3, R.A.M. and also served as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky in 1804.



George M. Bibb was born October 30, 1776, in Prince Edward County, Virginia, and attended Princeton University, graduating in 1792. He was a professor of ancient languages in the primary department of the Masonic College of Kentucky and later became a prominent lawyer in that state. He was chosen several times as Chief Justice and once Chancellor. He served as Senator from Kentucky from 1811 to 1814 and again from 1824 to 1835. He served as Secretary of the Treasury from 1844 to 1845 and died in Washington, DC on April 14, 1859.

HOWELL COBB

Howell Cobb was a native of Cherry Hill, GA, born there on September 7, 1815, and graduated from the University of Georgia in 1834. Initially a moderate he gradually became a secessionist. He owned one of the largest plantations in Georgia and kept about 1,000 slaves. He served in the House of Representatives from 1843 to 1851 and was elected again in 1855. In 1849 there was a serious division in the House which pitted Cobb against Robert C. Winthrop of MA for the position of Speaker, they fought it out for 3 weeks and 63 ballots with Cobb eventually winning out. He was appointed Secretary of the Treasury by Pres. Buchanan in 1857 but resigned in 1860 under a cloud of suspicion of having diverted Federal funds to the Secessionist Cause. He presided over the Congress of the Confederate States in 1860 and was then appointed a Brigadier General but took little part in military affairs. He died suddenly in New York City on October 9, 1869.



Bro. Cobb was a member of Mt. Vernon Lodge No. 22, Athens, GA, serving as Master in 1843. He acted as Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Georgia on November 13, 1843, and became an active member of the Southern Jurisdiction Supreme Council of the A.A.S.R. on March 31, 1860.

- 9/3/99 St. Helena Queen Mother's 100th Year of Life, four values plus a S/S, one stamp and the S/S picture King George VI.

DANIEL BOONE



Daniel Boone is honored by a commemorative stamp issued by the USPS on September 26, 1968, Scott No. 1357. A previous stamp, of June 1, 1942, Scott No. 904, was issued for the 150th Anniversary of Kentucky statehood - it pictures Boone and other pioneers.

He was born February 11, 1735, in Bucks County, PA, and emigrated to North Carolina where he married. In 1769 he penetrated the forests of Kentucky with five companions, was captured by the Indians, escaped and hunted in the region for more than a year. He returned home in 1771. Moving to Kentucky in 1773 he built a fort at Boonesborough in 1775. Captured again in 1778, he was taken to Detroit where he again escaped and returned to his fort. He moved west of St. Louis, MO, in 1795 and died in Missouri Sept. 26, 1820. His remains were moved to Kentucky in 1845.

There have been arguments over the years regarding Boone's membership. Bro. Ray V. Denslow, then Grand Secretary, Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Missouri, states that Boone was never a member of the Craft. Bros. Fred W. Hardwick, Grand Secretary of Kentucky, and Charles Comstock, Secretary of the Grand Lodge Historical Committee, could not prove his membership but did refer to a resolution in the Grand Lodge of Kentucky Proceedings which discussed the appropriation of \$50 to erect a lasting monument over his grave. Bro. Comstock recalled seeing a picture of Boone's burial and commented that one of the participants appeared to be wearing a Masonic Apron.
