

STAMP FOR THE SHRINERS

Bro. Peter J. Westbere proudly announces that Canada Post has announced that on September 19, 2001, they will issue a stamp to honor the Shriners. Issued in panes of 12 stamps, the First Day City will be Ottawa, ON. These stamps can be ordered directly from Canada Post using Visa, Master Card or American Express. The announcement of this issue by Canada Post in their magazine is very complimentary to the Fraternity and to the Shrine:

THE SHRINE OF NORTH AMERICA

In 1872, a group of 13 men belonging to the Masonic Order founded the Shrine of North America. Today, this international fraternity boasts approximately 610,000 members. Established to provide fun and fellowship for its members, the organization now spans the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Republic of Panama.

THE MASONIC ORDER

To become a Shriner, a man must first be a Mason. The fraternity of Freemasonry is the oldest, largest and most widely known fraternity in the world, dating back hundreds of years to when stonemasons and other craftsmen working on the same building project would gather in shelter houses, or lodges. Eventually, formal masonic lodges emerged, its members bound by the desire to be fraternal brothers. Freemasons follow three great principles: brotherly love, relief and truth.

THE WORLD'S GREATEST PHILANTHROPY

Since the earliest days of Freemasonry, Masons have showed concern for the care of orphans, the sick and the aged. As the Shrine of North America grew, its members began dedicating efforts to helping others by establishing an official shrine philanthropy - a network of specialized hospitals for children with orthopaedic problems. Since the first Shriners Hospital opened in 1922, the Shrine has supported what has come to be known as "the world's greatest philanthropy".



He has been trying for quite some time now to acquire the Mozart and Aldrin stamps from Guinee that bear the Masonic symbol. He heard about an auction in Belgium that had three of each of them as well as three of the Churchill and Lafayette stamps. He had been in Belgium 2 years ago and thought he remembered the exchange rate. He won the auction but had erred on the exchange rate by a decimal and what he thought would cost him \$24.00 turned out to be \$240.00. Obviously he paid the amount but now believes he really didn't want them that badly.

You editor has also been on the eBay (as captbob13) and has had some very interesting experiences. Over the past couple of months there has been a new line of "add on" cachets done by laser printing which are very attractive. I have been unsuccessful to date in identifying the publisher but have kept a log of all those offered (in case I update my Masonic Cacheted Covers catalog). I was been able to acquire some of them early in the game but the activity levels recently, hence the hammer prices, have been quite high. The most recent round ended with a few of the covers going for around \$50 each. I, personally, think that is too high and there must be individual interest because the resale market would never support that price.

LUIS ANTONIO ROBLES

(1849 - 1899)

Receiving his license to practice law in 1874, Luis Antonio Robles was elected Deputy of the Assembly of Magdalena and two years later was elected a Representative to Congress. That same year, President Aquileo Parra, also a Freemason, appointed him Minister of the Treasury and National Credit. On August 16, 1876, a revolution against the government erupted and he was sent to Garrapata and to Costa as a Chief of the General State, major of the Army of the Atlantic. He defeated the remaining rebels in Piaurichon. He was elected president of Magadalena and his government was an example of tolerance. By 1879 there was another revolution and he was defeated following a heroic defense. He retired from public life and watched the evolution of the new dictatorship. By 1892 Antioquia elected him Representative to the Chamber and he remained well-behaved and moderate. Various reports of ongoing revolutionary activities caused his arrest and detention for three months, he assisted Parra and Esquerra in reorganizing the Liberal Party but by 1896 he was sick and discouraged and did not want to participate any more in the political struggles. He was content with his professorship at the Republican University. There are several legendary tales of his calmness in the House of Representatives, even under adverse conditions such as the accusation of one conservative politician of "Negro, negro, negro". Locating the individual, he responded, "Yes, I am black, but above the walls of Cartagena whiten yet the bones of my forebears".

Doctor Robles was initiated into the Craft in the Lodge "Union No. 9 of Cartagena. He obtained the 18th degree of the Scottish Rite in the Souvereign Chapter Rose-Croix "Concordia" No. 1 of that same city. Information puplished in "Masoneria Colombiana", vol. 

ITALIAN SPECIAL MASONIC CANCELLATION

Bro. Ferrando Sergio of Camogli, Italy, has provided copies of a special Masonic cancel which was used on April 7, 2001 for the Gran Loggia Di Primavera of the Grande Oriente d'Italia.



ALBERT BERTEL THORVALDSEN

Bro. Thorvaldsen is pictured on several stamps of Denmark - Scott Nos. 264, 267 (1938 to commemorate his return to Denmark) and 477 (1970 for his birth bicentennail) are shown. His statue of Jason is pictured on Scott No. 265 (1938 set for his return).








Albert Bertel Thorvaldsen, the foremost sculptor of his era, was born in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1770 of a father who had been a minor woodcarver from Iceland. At age eleven, he entered the Royal Academy of Fine Arts where he was trained in neo-classical techniques. In 1797 he went to Rome to study and remained in Italy for 41 years. His early years were spent in poverty and obscurity though his Baccus and Ariadne (1799) in the Greek style attracted some attention. Soon his work was being praised by critics and commissions poured in. Among his better known are Hebe (1806), Priam Supplicating Achilles (1815) and Amor and Anacreon (1828). In 1812 he executed a frieze in relief over 100 feet long for Napoleon's visit to Rome. Posterity has considered his work cold and lifeless. He died on March 24, 1844, in the Copenhagen Theater and is buried in a museum dedicated to him.

Denslow indicates Albert Bertel Thorvaldsen was an Honorary Member of Zorubabel Lodge in Copenhagen. Information provided in June 1971 to Bro. Marshal Loke by the Q. C. Local Secretary in Denmark states "He seems to have been initiated in a Roman Lodge 'una loggia secreta' during the first years of the 19th century but his later connections with Masonry, abroad and in Denmark, are rather obscure. It is known that he visited Lodges in Switzerland. On October 27, 1819, he was made an Honorary Member of the Danish Lodge 'Friedrich zur gekronten Hoffnung' at that time time working simultaneously with another Danish Lodge, 'Zorobabel zum Nordstern'".

AUSTRALIAN STAMPS FOR DONALD BRADFORD

On March 13, 2001, Australia Post issued a pair of stamps to note the death of Bro. Donald Bradford. The designs are the same as were used for the 1997 Australian legends stamps, Scott 1575/6, but also have the years of his birth and death, 1908-2001. Bro. Eddie Levey has sent along copies of these stamps on maxim cards.



ANTI-MASONRY

Bro. Jean-Claude Vilespy has provided a two part dissertation on Anti-Masonry with ties to Masonic Philately. The first part, presented herein, is "The official position of the Roman Catholic Church on Freemasonry".

1738, May the 4: First Papal Bull of Clement XII, "In eminenti apostolatus specula", condemns the Freemasons as a secret company and writes: "for other rational and just reasons known by us...".


1884, May the 10: By Papal Bull "Humanum Genus", Leo XIII worsens previous condemnations. The Holy See defines the meaning on May 10 by reminding norms of condemnation by the Canon 2335 of the "Codex Juris Canonici": "...Those who adhere to a masonic sect or to all other similar associations that plot against the Church or legitimate civil authorities incur thereby the simply reserved excommunication to the Holy See".

1906, February the 18: First Encyclical of Pope Pius X condemning "the separation of the Church and State" in France. In a speech to the Cardinals' Consistory, Pius X declared: "We condemn the law...as offending to God, ominous to the devine constitution of the Church, contrary to our authority...".

An Arteraft First Day Cover of the American Music commemorative 5 cent issue of October 15, 1964, Scott 1252, contains likenesses of nine founders of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers. Prior to the founding of this organization, the music industry paid little attention to the rights of songwriters. Today these artists are assured of royalties from their creations.



Three of the ASCAP founders are identified as Masons, the other six have not. Of these six, Victor Herbert (1859-1924) is the best known. He was born in Ireland and came to the US in 1886 to play the cello. Soon he was composing for Broadway musicals. Glen MacDonough (1870-1924) was his lyricist for "Toyland". Nathan Burkan was his lawyer. Ray Hubbell (1879-1954) composed more than 30 shows as well as "Poor Butterfly". Louis Hirsch (1887-1924) was also a show composer with "Love Nest" to his credit. I have no data on George Maxwell.

Of the Masons:

Jacob (Jay) Witmark began his career as a ballard singer. He joined his brothers Julius and Isadore in starting a music publishing business. As all three were underage, their father, Marcus, fronted for them. By giving free copies to vaudevillians such as George M. Cohan, Chauncey Olcott and Weber and Fields, they soon made the firm successful. Victor Herbert, Sigmund Romberg and Ernest R. Ball signed with them.

The Witmark brothers all joined St. Cecile Lodge No. 568 in 1894. Their father was a member of Naval Lodge No. 69.

Silvio Hein was born in New York May 15, 1879 and died Dec. 19, 1928. From 1905 to 1922 he composed for Broasdway musicals. None of them are now well known, though some of the performers who sang his works were: Raymond Hitchcock, John Charles Thomas, DeWolf Hopper, Jefferson DeAngelis and Joseph Santley (all were Masons) Probably his best known work was "Heart of My Heart".

Gustave A. Kerker was born in Westphalia, Feb. 28, 1857, and died June 29, 1929. He came to the US in 1867 and, like Victor Herbert, he played the cello. Like Herbert he was a leading composer of show tunes and conductor. He led the orchestra for many of Lillian

No. 11613 Gillette Safety Razor Co. can be used to illustrate the inventor and first president of the company in the years from 1901 to 1931, King C. Gillette (1855-1932) who is mentioned as being a Mason. Ernest Cooper (1877-??) can also be considered as he was president of Gillette Industries, the European branch. He was initiated in 1911 in Canada Lodge No. 3527 of London. He was Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of England, Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia and Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.



The list includes: Edwin Austin Abbey (1852-1911), Dean Cornwell (1892-1960), Harvey Dunn (1884-1952), Robert Fawcett (1903-1967), James Montgomery Flagg (1877-1960), Arthur Bardett Frost (1851-1928), John Held, Jr. (1889-1958), Rockwell Kent (1882-1971), Joseph Chriatian Leyendecker (1874-1951), Neysa McMein (1888-1949), Rose O'Neill (1874-1944), Al Parker (1906-1985), Maxfield Parish (1870-1966), Coles Phillips (1880-1927), Howard Pyle (1853-1922), Frederic Remington (1861-1909), Norman Rockwell (1894-1978), Jessie Willcox Smith (1863-1935), Jon Whitcom (1906-1988) and Newell Convers Wyeth (1882-1945),




A cover for Harvey Dunn created by Bro. Edsel Hatfield, PO Box 36, Hazelwood, MO, 63042 is shown here.



DRESDEN GERMANY COVERS



"IRREGULAR" OBEDIENCES

Recently I have had several discussions with Masons from the so-called "irregular" obediences. Bro. Jean-Claude Vilespy offers some words on his Obedience;

An article writen a few years ago concerning Feminine Freemasonry presents the G(O(D(F(as an atheistic obedience. In his opinion, it is not an atheistic obedience, rather, it is an adogmatic obedience. To be atheistic means to deny the existence of God, under any forms. To be adogmatic means to accept no dogma, to be independent of all religion, all belief. <math>G(O(D(F(is fundamentally "lay" - a term also often misunderstood. in French, it allows every man, freely, whatever his belief or his unbelief, his religion or his philosophy, to live in an "initiatic way" based on the practice of Masonic Symbolism.

For us, the Freemason is, above all, a searching (cherchant) man. G(O(D(F(offers a structure where any man, whatever his ipinions, his color, his political membership, his religion or lack thereof, could live and share his certainties, his hesitations, his hopes, his doubts with those of his BB(for in the unique purpose of progressing in his own personality and in participating in the "material and moral progress of manhood".
