NEW MASONIC ISSUE

Two Souvenir Sheets picturing Masons and having Masonic symbols in the selvedge were issued by the Democratic Republic of the Congo on December 20, 2003. It appears that they were speculative issues and may not be considered legitimate releases by the purists. Unfortunately, there are two problems with these sheets: First, there are no names on the stamps and we have had to reach a consensus of opinion as to who is who. Second, if the individual stamps are removed from the sheet without selvedge, the direct Masonic tie is lost. Regardless, we should call them Masonic issues.



THE MASONS



The Masons, or Free Masons, are a worldwide fraternity of men dedicated to Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. It is not a religion but a man must be of good moral character and have a personal belief in a Supreme Being to become a member. Masonry takes a good man and makes him better.

Just what is a Masonic postage stamp?

It is simply a regular postage stamp that is easily recognized because it depicts a Masonic symbol, or, it honors one who is a Mason without identifying him as such or it depicts an item, piece of music or work of art done by or identified with one who is a Mason, and again, without identifying him as such.

Shown above is a truly Masonic Stamp. The "in your face" universal Masonic symbol, Square and Compasses, leave no doubt about that. Below, a few more obvious examples.



On the following sheets we see "Masonic" postage stamps. The persons shown were Brother Masons or the event/item shown was the work of a Brother.

ETHICS OF ADD-ON CACHETS ON FIRST DAY COVERS

There are many Masonic First Day Covers offered on eBay. Some of them are "Add-Ons" – cachets which are applied to the First Day Cover, or any commemorative item, after the cancellation for the FDOI or event has been applied to the item. Many of these are identified as "Add-Ons" but others are not. John White of FDC USA, Pine Bluff, NC, has been a vocal advocate for declaration of "Add-Ons" and has prepared a treatise on the subject. Excerpts from this paper are presented here with some additions from the Editor.

He states that there are three types of Add-Ons - Planned, Non-Planned and Counterfeit.


Planned – Many cachet makers who produce hand-drawn and/or hand colored/painted artwork do not apply their artwork until the cancellations have been applied, so to remove the risk of damage to items they have already spent time and labor creating. These types of "add-on" cachets are accepted by collectors as 'legitimate' as long as the cachet maker planned to produce a specific design to the items before they were cancelled (or serviced) by or for the cachet maker. Many will add the date for each item and the actual number produced so there will be no questions about it later.

Un-Planned – These are cachets applied to the commemorative item after the item was cancelled, with no pre-planning of adding the artwork before they were acquired by the cachet maker. As each item is produced, the cachet maker puts their logo or name and the month/year the artwork was added on the item so there will be no questions in the future. If the cachet maker believes more will be produced later, "cont" is noted by the logo/date and a record is maintained.

Counterfeit — Some counterfeits involve the application of a First Day of Issue cancellation on a prepared cached cover well after the FDOI — an outright forgery. • thers involve the addition of cachets to covers which were processed with no intention of receiving cachets or the cachet is placed over a previous cachet. Various warning signs are identified such as computer generated cachets, artwork over an address or extremely close to the cancellation, reference in the cachet to dates after the stamp issue date and no identification of the cachet maker. By not identifying the "add-on" status a novice is led to believe that they were pre-planned and the same credibility of preparation and planning that many cachet makers put into their work is assumed. Unfortunately, many of the unidentified "add-ons" are realizing higher prices purely because they are done on older issues — those cachets would never have withstood the effects of time and exposure had they been applied at the time of stamp issue.

Individuals can add spice to their items by personalizing the artwork or using any available graphics or text. It is important that any creations be identified with the individual's name or logo and the date applied so that the next owner of the item will not confuse it to be original artwork of the period. I have seen many examples of Masonic Cacheted Covers which fall into this category that have not been identified as "add-ons". They may be unique but they should be properly identified. In too many cases, however, the cachet maker keeps producing more and more covers until the demand ceases and one never knows how many copies exist.


INTERESTING AUTOGRAPHED MASONC CACHETED COVER


REPUBLIC OF GUINEE MASONIC SOUVENIR SHEETS

JOSEF KSAWERY (or XAVER) ELSNER

Up to the reign of Poland's last King, Stanislaw Poniatowski, opera had been the preserve of the nobility, with Italian and German operas being given in court theatres. Under Poniatowski, Poland enjoyed a cultural flowering that included the building of the National theatre in 1779 and the writing of the first Polish Operas. Josef Elsner was appointed Principal Conductor of the National in 1799, holding that position for the next 25 years. His early operas, before 1799, were in German, but all his works for the National Theatre were in Polish. These operas were extremely popular and because they contain elements of Polish musical folklore and are considered precursors to the Polish national style in opera. Today Elsner is remembered, if at all, as being Chopin's composition teacher from 1819. He was also the director of the Warsaw Conservatoire and an influential critic.

Josef Elsner was born June 29, 1769 in Grodkow, Silesia. He studied violin, voice and organ and founded a school for organists in Warsaw. He wrote 32 operas, 17 masses, 7 ballets, 3 symphonies and many other quartets and sonatas. He died April 18, 1854 in Warsaw. He was a member of the Lodge "Bouclier du Nord" in Warsaw, founded in 1779, while the Duke Ignaz Potocki, a co-worker of Kosciuszko, was Grand Master. He composed a Masonic hymn in 1805. His likeness is shown on a Poland stamp, Scott NB22, issued in 1942.

2003 – Liberia – European Masters, 4 stamps, 4 se-tenant stamps and a souvenir sheet - all picturing works of A. Durer.

March – St. Helena – Famous People in Medicine, 4 values, including A. Fleming.


March 19 – Ireland – Ernest Shackleton Antarctic Expedition 1914-1917, 2 se-tenant pairs of stamps, a souvenir sheet with a se-tenant pair of stamps and a prestige booklet with 16 stamps.

April 6 – Isle of Man – D-Day 60th Anniversary, 4 se-tenant pairs of stamps and souvenir sheet with 4 se-tenant stamps, including Winston Churchill.


EDITORS COMMENTS


